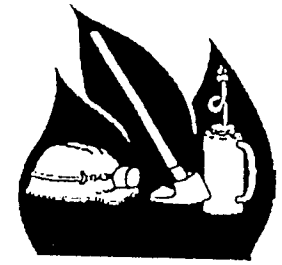

## SAFETY GRAM

### ACCIDENT/INCIDENT SUMMARY: FATALITIES AND ENTRAPMENTS 98-01

The following data indicate the 1997 fatalities, entrapments\* and entrapment-related injuries associated with wildland and prescribed fire operations. There were 10 fatalities and 29 firefighters entrapped. The information was collected by the NWCG Safety & Health Working Team, with confirmation from the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA).

These accidents reinforce the need for being continually alert to the "Situations That Shout Watch Out" and ensuring that all of the "10 Standard Fire Fighting Orders" are followed before initiating tactical operations.

A simple concept to remember and share with crew members is "L.C.E.S." The acronym stands for Lookouts, Communication, Escape Routes, and Safety Zones. If a fire crew has these four areas fully established and understood, they can anticipate a safer assignment.

Based on brief information received, New South Wales, Australia reported four firefighter fatalities and eight seriously injured firefighters in the last four week period of 1997. One fatality and several injuries occurred when the firefighters took refuge under fire blankets on the floor of their tanker truck. Australia is experiencing a very severe and extended drought which contributed to a disastrous fire season.

Timely reporting of entrapments or fatalities is necessary for the rapid dissemination of accurate information to the fire community. It also allows fire safety and equipment specialists to quickly respond to these events as appropriate. Completion of the Wildland Fire Entrapment/Fatality Initial Report (NFES 0869) accomplishes this need. This initial report is self explanatory and does not replace agency reporting or investigative responsibilities, policies or procedures.

\*Entrapment: A situation where personnel are unexpectedly caught in a fire behavior-related, life-threatening position where planned escape routes or safety zones are absent, inadequate, or have been compromised. An entrapment may or may not include deployment of a fire shelter for its intended purpose. These situations may or may not result in injury. They include "near misses."
