Sandy, Big Cypress National Preserve, NPS. Twenty-two miles northeast of Carnestown, FL. Southern rough, grass and hardwood litter. Active fire behavior with wind-driven runs, short-range spotting and running. Structures threatened. Area and trail closures in effect.

Great Lakes, National Forests in North Carolina, USFS. One mile southeast of New Bern, NC. Chaparral, hardwood slash and timber. Minimal fire behavior with smoldering. Numerous structures threatened. Area, road and trail closures in effect.

Predictive Services Discussion:

Dry and breezy conditions will result in moderate to high-risk significant fire potential in New England near a pre-frontal trough, while critically low relative humidity with breezy afternoon winds will develop from northern Minnesota through northern Wisconsin and much of Michigan as well. Hot and dry conditions will continue from southwest Arizona through southeast California into southern Nevada, with above normal temperatures on much of the West Coast into the northern Intermountain West. However, chances of thunderstorms and showers will extend from the Southwest and broader Four Corners region through the Great Basin into the Pacific Northwest and northern Rockies. Widespread showers and thunderstorms are likely over south and central Texas and from eastern Oklahoma and Kansas through Missouri into central Illinois and northern Arkansas. Scattered showers and thunderstorms will continue over much of the Southeast. Precipitation and below normal temperatures will move over western portions of Alaska, with drier and warmer temperatures in the eastern Interior and through the Panhandle.
