**Great Lakes**, National Forests in North Carolina, USFS. One mile southeast of New Bern, NC. Chaparral, hardwood slash and timber. Minimal fire behavior with smoldering and spotting. Numerous structures threatened. Area, road and trail closures in effect.

**Sandy**, Big Cypress National Preserve, NPS. Twenty-two miles northeast of Carnestown, FL. Southern rough, grass and hardwood litter. Minimum fire behavior with smoldering and creeping. Area and trail closures in effect.

## **Predictive Services Discussion:**

Dry and breezy southwest winds will create elevated fire weather conditions and moderate to high risk significant fire potential across the Northeast today. A cold front will move through the Great Lakes today with showers and thunderstorms bringing light to moderate rain today, and into the Northeast tomorrow bringing temporary relief. This cold front will also move through the southern Plains today and into the Southeast this weekend. Scattered to widespread thunderstorms, some severe, are forecast across the southern Plains today, with scattered thunderstorms across the Southeast this weekend including the Florida Peninsula. Above normal temperatures will continue across the West, with record highs possible in portions of the northern Intermountain West. Isolated to scattered thunderstorms are also forecast across the West, with the most widespread rainfall across portions of the Southwest and southern Rockies. Upper ridging will build over Alaska this weekend with temperatures rising to above normal over much of the Interior, but significant fire potential will remain very low to non-existent.
