

INCIDENT MANAGEMENT SITUATION REPORT
SATURDAY SEPTEMBER 10, 1994 - 0700 MDT
NATIONAL PREPAREDNESS LEVEL V

Current Situation: Fire activity moderated significantly on most large fires in Idaho and Oregon due to higher humidities and lower temperatures. High winds in Montana increased fire activity. A Type I and a Type II Incident Management Team were assigned internally in the Northern Rockies. A Type II Incident Management Team was mobilized from the Rocky Mountain Area to the Eastern Great Basin. Crews are being mobilized through NICC to the Northern Rockies and Eastern Great Basin. Moderate Initial attack activity continued throughout the West.

Colonel Chip Leonard, USA, is the Task Force Commander of one Battalion and one Aviation Unit assigned to the Corral Creek and Blackwell fires. Colonel Joseph Leigh, USA, is the Task Force Commander of one Battalion assigned to the Koocanusa Complex.

Eastern Great Basin Area Large Fires:

CORRAL CREEK, Payette NF. A Type I Incident Management Team (Monahan), and the 1st Engineer Battalion, 1st Infantry Division, USA (Lt. Col. Bostick, Commander) are assigned. Helicopter support is being provided by the 4th Battalion, 1st Aviation Brigade, (Lt. Col. Brostrom, Commander) and the A/6-158th Aviation Unit, USAR. Fire activity was minimal due to cooler temperatures and higher humidities. Mop-up on the eastern flanks and rehabilitation of firelines continued.

IDAHO CITY COMPLEX, Boise NF. A Type I Incident Management Team (Maupin) is assigned. The complex consists of the BANNOCK, BEAR RIVER, RABBIT CREEK and NORTH FORK fires. Direct attack by handline across the head of the fire is planned for today. Incident Command Post will move from Idaho City to the Warm Springs landing strip today.

CHICKEN COMPLEX, Payette NF. A Type I Incident Management Team (O'Bannon) is assigned. Higher humidities and cooler temperatures kept the fire from making any major runs like those experienced the last two days. Dozer line was built between Warren Summit and the town of Warren to cut off the 9/8 run. O'Bannons Team will transition out with Birch's Team today.

BLACKWELL COMPLEX, Payette NF. A Type I Incident Management Team (Monahan) is managing this complex along with the Corral Creek fire. Helicopter support is being provided by the 4th Battalion, 1st Aviation Brigade (Lt. Col. Brostrom, Commander) and the A/6-158th Aviation Unit, USAR. Lower temperatures and higher humidities kept fire activity to a minimum. Scattered light showers occurred during the afternoon. Some rehabilitation of handline and dozer line is complete.

THUNDERBOLT, Boise NF. A Type II Incident Management Team (Martin) is assigned. The 4th Battalion, 1st Aviation Brigade, USA is providing helicopter support. Erratic high winds caused continued fire activity. Much of the activity was within the fire perimeter with little spread outside of yesterdays growth. Several small spots west of the South Fork Salmon River Road were suppressed.

TIN CUP COMPLEX, Caribou NF. No new information received.

PIONEER COMPLEX, Challis NF. This complex consists of the PIONEER CREEK and NORTON LAKE fires. The fire remains active on the north flank. Crews are continuing to hold, contain and mop-up. Helicopter operations were shut down yesterday afternoon due to high winds.

Northern Rockies Area Large Fires:

BLACK BUTTE, Gallatin NF. A Type II Incident Management Team (Bennett) is assigned. Strong winds pushed the fire head approximately 5 miles to the northeast. One residence was evacuated two miles ahead of the fire.

BABY DEAN, Northern Cheyenne Agency, BIA. A Type I Incident Management Team (Meuchel) is assigned. The fire is threatening homes and six residences have been evacuated. Four shelter deployments occurred. There were no injuries. All crews were pulled off the fire.

WINDY POINT, Lewistown District, BLM. A Type II Incident Management Team (Stone) is assigned. The fire made runs on both the east and west flanks. An isolated storm passed over the fire producing erratic winds. A trace of rain was received on portions of the fire. The fire continues to threaten residences.

KOOCANUSA COMPLEX, Kootenai NF. The 3-11th Field Artillery, I Corps (Lt. Col. Patterson) is committed. The complex is contained.

POWELL COMPLEX, Clearwater NF. A Type II Incident Management Team (Hodge) is assigned. This complex includes the FREEZEOUT, FERN CREEK, SPONGE, EAST BEAVER, BIG SAND, HIDDEN CREEK, HESLIP RIDGE and GOLD MEADOWS fires. Upon completion of line work along the north flank of the Freezeout fire yesterday, containment objectives have been met.

DRY HEAD, Crow Agency, BIA. No new information was received.

NORTH FORK COMPLEX, Glacier NP. The major fires in the complex are: STARVATION, HOWLING and ADAIR II. The south side of Sullivan Meadow has been burned out and has formed a containment line limiting the southward spread of the Howling fire. The Adair II fire is moving toward the west and has grown to approximately 1,600 acres.

SMITH CREEK, Gallatin NF. A Type II Incident Management Team (Cowin) is

assigned. High winds has caused the fire to spot into heavy fuels. The fire is threatening private property, structures and timber.

TWIN LAKES, Wallowa-Whitman NF. A Type I Incident Management Team (Lieberbach) and a Type II Incident Management Team (Duke) are assigned. Higher humidities and lower temperatures helped off set increased winds. Progress was made in line construction and mop-up. Heavy mop-up occurred around Russell Mtn. Lookout.

Alaska Incidents:

KOYUKUK FLOOD, Alaska State. A Type II Incident Management Team (Abbott) is assigned. The villages of Hughes, Allakaket and Alatna have been affected by the floods, 252 residents from these villages are being sheltered in Fairbanks. Electrical and temporary services were reestablished in Hughes. Support facilities have been established in Allakaket. Clean up of homes and

facilities is progressing in Hughes, recovery of personal property is accelerating in Allakaket and Alatna.

Outlook: *** A RED FLAG WARNING is posted in southern Nevada, western and southeast Utah and eastern Montana for low humidity and strong, gusty southwest winds. A RED FLAG WATCH is posted in northwest Arizona, southwest and northeast Utah and central and eastern Wyoming for increasing winds. *** A major cool level trough continues to moves onto the Pacific coast. This trough extends from northern British Columbia to the southern California coast. A Strong southwest flow will produce gusty winds east of the trough. Instability and showers will continue in the Pacific Northwest and across the northern states. A few showers will continue in the Intermountain West and northern California. The remainder of the west will be dry. Most areas across the West will have cooler temperatures. Fire activity is expected to moderate with cooler temperatures and higher humidities in Oregon and Idaho. Increased fire activity is possible in the areas where high winds are predicted.
