

INCIDENT MANAGEMENT SITUATION REPORT
TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 5, 1995 - 0530 MDT
NATIONAL PREPAREDNESS LEVEL II

*** SAFETY COMES FIRST ON EVERY FIRE, EVERY TIME ***

Current Situation: Most Geographic areas experienced increased initial attack activity over the weekend. Large fire activity occurred in the Northwest, Northern Rockies and North Zone California with internal mobilization of Incident Management Teams. The Great Basin, South Zone California and Eastern Area also experienced large fires with containment being met on most of those fires. Resource mobilization through NICC increased as the weekend progressed. The Southern Area Type II Incident Management Team is on alert to support areas affected by Hurricane Luis. Landfall is expected late today or early tomorrow morning with the eye of the storm passing just south of Puerto Rico.

Northwest Area Large Fires:

CHELAN COMPLEX, Wenatchee N.F. A Type I Incident Management Team (Wands) is assigned. The fires are burning in steep, inaccessible terrain on the east side of Lake Chelan.

PRINGLE, Deschutes N.F. A Type II Incident Management Team (Lohrey) is assigned. The fire continues to burn on both sides of the Deschutes river. Residents have been allowed to return to their homes. Good progress was made on line construction yesterday.

LABOR, Deschutes N.F. Aggressive suppression efforts held the fire yesterday. Crews will continue to mop-up today.

OVERHOLD, Malheur N.F. This fire is burning in the Strawberry Wilderness Area. Crews will try to keep the spread of the fire upslope into rock and scree slopes.

HALFWAY SPRINGS, Wenatchee N.F. A Type II Incident Management Team (Furlong) is assigned. The prognosis for stopping the spread of the fire last night was reported to be good.

DEAD HORSE FLAT, Wallowa-Whitman N.F. A Type II Incident Management Team (Lukens) is assigned.

OUTLOOK: An upper level low pressure system is slowly moving northeast onto the Washington coast bringing scattered wet thunderstorms to Washington and Oregon. A weak surface cold front extending from northern Idaho to north central Nevada will move very slowly to the east. Monsoon moisture will bring scattered, mainly wet thunderstorms along a band from southern California northeast to the Rockies and up to the Canadian border. Isolated thunderstorms are forecast for southern California, southern Nevada and southern Utah. High temperatures will range from the mid 60's to near 80 in the Pacific Northwest, upper 80's to near 90 in the Great Basin and mid 90's to 115 in the desert Southwest. High pressure will continue to bring warm and dry weather to the northeastern U.S. Winds will be light, with high temperatures in the 80's to near 90. Fire activity is expected to continue as thunderstorm activity prevails and holdover fires are detected.
