South Zone California Large Fires:

APACHE, Riverside Ranger Unit, California State. The fire is burning in very steep inaccessible terrain. The fire started on California State lands and has burned onto the San Bernardino National Forest. The fire burned actively through the night.

Hurricane Marilyn Support:

A Type I Incident Management Team (O'Bannon) is managing a receiving and distribution center on St. Thomas. Supplies stored by the Team for the Red Cross have been delivered to that agencies new warehouse.

A Type II Incident Management Team (Kearney) is managing a receiving and distribution center on St. Croix. Within the past 24 hours 11 aircraft loads of relief supplies have been received.

A State Incident Management Team (Hendricks) is managing a receiving and distribution center at Roosevelt Roads Naval Air Station in Puerto Rico. Sorting and redistribution of relief supplies for the Virgin Islands continued.

A NPS All Risk Management Team (Wissinger) continues to assess damages and prioritize needs for generators and services for Park facilities on St. Thomas and St. John. No report from this Team today.

Southcentral Alaska Flood Response:

A Type I Incident Management Team (Liebersbach) is assigned to the State of Alaska Department of Emergency Services (ADES). They will assist in operating the State Emergency Operations Center located in Anchorage. Their mission is to act as deputies to the ADES management staff. The Team is working with the staff to develop processes to support disaster response and recovery in two boroughs. The incident involves major flooding in Seward, Soldotna and a

number of remote communities in both the Matanuska-Sustina and Kenai Peninsula boroughs. There are hundreds of homes and several businesses which have been or continue to be flooded.

A Type II Incident Management Team (Wilcox) was mobilized yesterday to staff an Emergency Operations Center in Kenai. They are expected to be in place today.

OUTLOOK: A weak trough of low pressure has developed aloft over the Western U.S., bringing a cooler and more humid air mass from the Pacific Ocean into Washington, Oregon, Idaho and northern Nevada. The remainder of the West will be dry and mostly sunny, except along the California coast where low clouds will persist. High temperatures will reach the 50's to 70's in the Rocky Mountains. The Great Basin will have high temperatures in the 70's and 80's. The Pacific Northwest will have high temperatures in the 60's and 70's. Seasonably warm weather will extend from the northern California valleys to the desert Southwest where highs will range from the 80's to 105 degrees. The Northeastern U.S. will have occasional rain with highs in the 50's and 60's and south winds at 5-15 MPH. Minor fire activity is expected to continue in most areas.
