

INCIDENT MANAGEMENT SITUATION REPORT
THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 25, 1997 - 0530 MDT
NATIONAL PREPAREDNESS LEVEL II

CURRENT SITUATION: Large fire activity increased significantly in Southern California, necessitating the mobilization of three Type II Incident Management Teams. Resource mobilization through NICC consisted of 4 crews, 3 airtankers, 1 leadplane, 2 type I helicopters, 4 caterers, 3 showers and miscellaneous overhead. Minimal fire activity occurred elsewhere. Very high and extreme fire indices were reported on several units in Southern California. Multiple units in the Western Great Basin and Northern Rockies reported very high fire indices.

SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA LARGE FIRES:

DEL DIOS, San Diego Ranger Unit, California Department of Forestry. Erratic winds caused by Hurricane Nora have caused control problems on this arson fire. Current threats are to structures and livestock in the area. One structure has been destroyed.

COFFEE, Sequoia NF. A Type II Incident Management Team (Benik) is assigned. Erratic winds and steep terrain are hampering control efforts. The Sicon Youth Science camp is threatened. Structure protection has been established.

DEMOCRAT, Sequoia NF. This fire is located near Democrat Hot Springs. Highway 178 is currently closed.

HOMESTEAD, Los Padres NF. A Type II Incident Management Team (Smith) is assigned. The fire is moving at a moderate rate of spread with west winds and occasional spotting. Scattered structures in the area are threatened. Several roads in the area have been closed.

AMPHITHEATER, Sequoia and Kings Canyon NP. A Type II Incident Management Team (Bacon) is assigned.

JACK RABBIT, Riverside Ranger Unit, California Department of Forestry. Highway 60 was closed due to heavy smoke in the area.

KEEN, San Bernardino NF. This arson caused fire is burning 3 miles south of Idyllwild, CA. Current concerns include spotted owl habitat and structures in the area. Containment was expected last night.

POPPET, Riverside Ranger Unit, California Department of Forestry. This fire is burning 3 miles south of Banning, CA. Wind shifts, high temperatures, and limited access have hindered control efforts. The fire received light rain yesterday. Containment was expected last night.

CITY CREEK, San Bernardino NF. This arson caused fire is burning 4

miles north of Highland, CA. Highway 330 has been reopened. Steep terrain is hindering control efforts.

OUTLOOK:

The remains of Hurricane Nora will continue to move toward southern California. This will bring mostly cloudy conditions with showers and thunderstorms to the central and southern portions of the state. Locally heavy rain is possible in the south. Northern California will have increasing clouds and a chance of afternoon showers and thunderstorms. Temperatures will be in the 70's in the mountains, the 80's and 90's in the coastal valleys, and into the 90's in the interior valleys.

Western Washington will be mostly cloudy with a chance of rain along the coast. The eastern portion of the state will be mostly sunny and continued warm. Oregon will have increasing clouds and a chance of showers late in the day. Temperatures will be cooler. Highs will be 65 to 75 in western Washington, and the 70's and 80's in eastern Washington and Oregon.

Nevada and Utah will have increasing clouds in the north with afternoon showers and thunderstorms. Showers and thunderstorms with locally heavy rain are predicted in the south. Temperatures will be in the 70's and 80's across both states.

A FIRE WEATHER WATCH HAS BEEN POSTED FOR EASTERN MONTANA FOR LOW RELATIVE HUMIDITIES AND INCREASING WIND. The entire state will be sunny and dry with above normal temperatures. Highs will reach the 70's in the west and the 80's and 90's in the east.

A nearly stationary front will extend from the Carolinas to Louisiana. Mostly cloudy conditions and numerous showers and thunderstorms are possible throughout the area. Southeastern temperatures will be in the 70's and 80's.
