

## INCIDENT MANAGEMENT SITUATION REPORT

SATURDAY, JULY 18, 1998 - 0900 MDT

NATIONAL PREPAREDNESS LEVEL III

### CURRENT SITUATION:

New large fire activity was reported in the Western Great Basin, Northern Rockies and Southern Areas. Good progress continued on large fires in Florida. The National Interagency Coordination Center processed orders for crews, overhead, aircraft, shower and caterer units for the Northern Rockies and Western Great Basin Areas. Heavy demobilization from fires in Florida is continuing. Very high and extreme fire indices were reported in Florida, Georgia, Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, Colorado, Utah, Nevada, California and Washington.

### SOUTHERN AREA LARGE FIRES:

**JACKSONVILLE II COMPLEX**, Florida State - Nassau, Duval and Clay Counties. A Type II Incident Management Team (Carr) is assigned. Crews are concentrating on containing the Crowl fire. Acreage change was due to remapping.

**FLAGLER/ST. JOHNS COMPLEX**, Florida State, Flagler and St. Johns Counties. A Type I Incident Management Team (Loving ) is assigned. Unified Command with Florida Division of Forestry (Votolina) is in effect. This complex was mistakenly reported as contained. The priority continues to be mop-up in the urban interface.

**SUWANNEE OAK COMPLEX**, Florida State - Columbia, Union, Bradford and Baker Counties. This fire is managed by the Florida Division of Forestry. Crews and engine personnel continue to mop-up and rehabilitated the fireline.

**HONEY SCRUB COMPLEX**, Okefenokee NWR. This fire is burning in dry scrub and grass in the Okefenokee Refuge. A Type I Incident Management Team (Dubois) is assigned. Heavy rains the past several days have greatly reduced fire spread. Reports indicate the water level within the swamp has risen two inches. An infrared flight detected two hot spots.

**BOUT TIME**, Sabine NWR. This fire was caused by the exhaust from an air boat. A passing thunderstorm pushed the fire in all directions. The fire received only a trace of precipitation. The fire burned within 50 feet of a cabin. The west and east flanks are being held by canals. The fire has the potential to burn another 200-300 acres, where fire crews expect to hold the fire with local resources and another canal.

## WESTERN BASIN LARGE FIRE:

UNION COMPLEX, Ely District, BLM. A Type II Incident Management Team (Butler) is assigned. This fire is burning in grass and sage fifteen miles south of Caliente. This complex consists of fourteen fires, the Stein and Boyd fires account for the majority of the acreage. The fires are burning in very steep and rough canyon terrain which is hindering radio communications.

## NORTHERN ROCKIES LARGE FIRE:

PARKSIDE, Custer NF. A Type II Incident Management Team (Specht) is assigned. This fire is burning near the Parkside campground, twelve miles southwest of Red Lodge. Steep, rocky terrain, high temperatures, low relative humidity and predicted dry lightning are hampering suppression efforts.

#### OUTLOOK:

A FIRE WEATHER WATCH IS POSTED IN CENTRAL MONTANA FOR A FEW DRY LIGHTNING THUNDERSTORMS. The western U.S. will have a strong upper level ridge bring very hot and dry conditions. There will be scattered thunderstorms in central Arizona to central New Mexico and a few thunderstorms from central Montana to northwest Wyoming. High temperatures will be 80's in the mountains to 120 in the valleys and deserts.

Florida and southern Georgia will be partly cloudy with scattered showers and thunderstorms. High temperatures will be in the lower to mid 90's.
