

INCIDENT MANAGEMENT SITUATION REPORT
 SUNDAY, JULY 4, 1999 - 0900 MDT
 NATIONAL PREPAREDNESS LEVEL II

CURRENT SITUATION:

Initial attack and large fire activity continued in the Rocky Mountain, Great Basin, northern California and Northwest Areas. Alaska reported several thousand new acres burned on fires in limited suppression areas. The National Interagency Coordination Center mobilized an infrared aircraft, airtankers, helicopters, a shower unit, radio equipment, engines, crews and miscellaneous overhead. High to extreme fire indices were reported in Nevada, California, Arizona, New Mexico, Utah, Colorado, Alaska, Wyoming, west Texas and Idaho.

EASTERN GREAT BASIN LARGE FIRES:

RAILROAD, Richfield Field Office, BLM. A Type I Incident Management Team (Storey) is assigned. This fire is 24 miles northwest of Nephi, UT. The fire exhibited rapid rates of spread in fine flashy fuels. The community of Mammoth and part of Eureka were evacuated and remain threatened.

WRIGLEY, Moab Field Office, BLM. A Type II Incident Management Team (Suwyn) is assigned. This fire is 50 miles southwest of Grand Junction, CO. This fire has burned into the Black Ridge Complex on Grand Junction District, BLM. No other information was reported.

MEADOW SPRING, Cedar City Field Office, BLM. This fire is 60 miles northwest of Cedar City, UT. Eight structures northeast of the fire are threatened. Retardant was used for structure protection.

RUSH, Northwest Utah State. This fire is three miles west of Stockton, UT. Control efforts were hampered by high winds and accessibility problems. The fire burned up to the edge of the Tooele Army Depot.

STEAMBOAT, Moab Field Office, BLM. This fire is 50 miles southwest of Grand Junction, CO in a remote area. No new information was reported.

ROCKY MOUNTAIN AREA LARGE FIRES:

BLACK RIDGE COMPLEX, Grand Junction District, BLM. A Type II Incident

Management Team (Sexton) is assigned. The fires in this complex are 20 to 25 miles west of Grand Junction, CO. The Tom's Canyon fires and fires in the Black Ridge Wilderness Study Area comprise this complex. The fires are threatening camp sites, ranch structures and riparian areas. Recreational activities along the Colorado River could be affected by the fires.

FRUITLAND, Montrose District, BLM. This fire is 10 miles west of Crawford, CO. The fire cooled significantly yesterday with the aid of a single engine airtanker. Volunteer Fire Department Engines were released.

NORTH RIDGE, Craig District, BLM. A Type II Incident Management Team (Hart) is assigned. This fire is near Meeker, CO. Crews made good progress on all flanks of the fire yesterday, despite torching and small runs.

BLACK MOUNTAIN, Grand Junction District, BLM. This fire is burning on private and BLM land five miles north of Mesa, CO. Although weather conditions were extreme yesterday, crews were still able to make good progress.

NORTHERN CALIFORNIA LARGE FIRES:

LOWDEN, California Department of Forestry, Shasta-Trinity Ranger Unit. A State Type I Incident Management Team (Johnson) is assigned. This fire is near the community of Lewiston, CA. Twenty-three homes and three outbuildings were confirmed destroyed. All roads in the area were opened and evacuated residents were permitted back in their homes yesterday.

MAJOR CREEK, Southeast Washington State. A State Type II Incident Management Team is assigned. This fire is burning in fine fuels three miles west of Lyle, WA. No new information was reported.

OUTLOOK:

*** FIRE WEATHER WATCHES ARE POSTED IN EASTERN, CENTRAL AND SOUTHERN NEVADA FOR POSSIBLE STRONG WINDS, MOST OF UTAH FOR GUSTY WINDS, WESTERN COLORADO FOR GUSTY SOUTHWEST WINDS AND WYOMING'S SOUTHERN PLAINS FOR GUSTY AFTERNOON WINDS. A NEAR RED FLAG WARNING HAS BEEN POSTED FOR THE LARAMIE VALLEY AND SOUTHEAST MOUNTAINS OF WYOMING FOR GUSTY WINDS AND LOW RELATIVE HUMIDITY THIS AFTERNOON ***

A weakening upper level trough over the northwest states will bring unseasonably cool temperatures with showers and isolated wet thunderstorms to Washington, Oregon, northern Idaho and northwest Montana. Southern Idaho, northwest Wyoming and eastern Montana will be breezy and cool with isolated afternoon thunderstorms in northwest Wyoming and eastern Montana.

South of the trough over the Great Basin strong upper level winds aloft are expected to surface in the afternoon bringing sustained winds of 15 to 25 MPH, gusting to 35 MPH over much of Nevada, Utah, northern Arizona, New Mexico and southern Wyoming. Limited moisture will confine thunderstorm activity to the mountains of New Mexico, Arizona, Colorado and Wyoming. There is a chance of dry thunderstorms over northeast Utah and northwest Colorado.

California will be mostly sunny with lighter winds and areas of fog and low clouds along the coast.

High temperatures will range from the 60's and 70's along the Pacific coast and the northern states. Inland California, Utah, Nevada and Wyoming will have highs in the 80's. Colorado, Arizona and New Mexico will have highs in the 90's with the southwestern deserts reaching 110 degrees.
