

INCIDENT MANAGEMENT SITUATION REPORT
WEDNESDAY, MAY 17, 2000 - 0530 MDT
NATIONAL PREPAREDNESS LEVEL III

CURRENT SITUATION:

New large fires were reported in the Southern and Southwest Areas. Crews made progress toward containment objectives on all the Southwest Area large fires yesterday, in spite of strong winds throughout the region. The National Interagency Coordination Center processed orders for helicopters, air tankers, infrared aircraft, radio equipment, engines, crews, and miscellaneous overhead. Very high to extreme fire indices were reported in New Mexico, Arizona, Texas, Oklahoma, Colorado, Utah, and Montana.

On 5/13, Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt and Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman announced a 30-day suspension of all federal prescribed fires west of the 100th meridian. For more information, see the U.S. Forest Service Fire web page at www.fs.fed.us/fire/news.shtml.

SOUTHWEST AREA LARGE FIRES:

CERRO GRANDE, Bandelier National Monument. An Area Command Team (Meuchel) and two Type I Incident Management Teams (Humphrey and Bateman) are assigned. A Type I Incident Management Team (Gage) will complete the transition with Bateman's team today. The fire is burning near Los Alamos, NM. Despite steady strong winds, no major problems have been encountered. Crews are positioned to suppress any spot fires which may occur. Patrol and mop-up operations continue on the south side of the fire.

SCOTT ABLE, Lincoln National Forest. The fire is located 20 miles south of Cloudcroft, NM. A Type I Incident Management Team (Studebaker) is assigned. Significant progress has been made in establishing direct fireline. Wind gusts of 50 mph caused some spotting yesterday. Unburned islands and green fuels adjacent to indirect firelines are causing control problems.

OUTLET, Grand Canyon National Park. A Type I Incident Management Team (Frye) is assigned. The fire is burning in designated and proposed wilderness 25 miles south of Jacob Lake, AZ. Strong winds, which caused air operations to be suspended, spread the fire through the Saddle Mountain Wilderness area. Crews were able to hold existing fireline and to accomplish a limited amount of new fireline construction, in spite of the high winds.

COON CREEK, Tonto National Forest. The fire is 20 miles north of Globe, AZ in the Sierra Ancha Wilderness. Demobilization of resources is underway.

SOUTHERN AREA LARGE FIRES:

LONG BAY, National Forests of Florida. A Type II Incident Management Team (Wilkins) has been ordered. This fire is in the Apalachicola National Forest, 40 miles southwest of Tallahassee, FL. The size of the fire increased due to spotting in heavy swamp fuels. Drought conditions are hampering containment.

FLOWERS, Florida State Division of Forestry. The fire is ten miles northwest of Port Charlotte, FL. The fire jumped Interstate 75 yesterday afternoon and is moving toward North Port, FL. The cause of the fire was lightning.

COOK RANCH, Texas State Forest Service. The fire is located 36 miles south of Ft. Stockton, TX. High winds are forecast for today.

CALVERT SWAMP, Alabama State Forestry Commission. The fire is burning in a cypress swamp 30 miles north of Mobile, Alabama. Containment is expected today.

CEDAR RIDGE, Blue Ridge Parkway, National Park Service. The fire is near Traphill, NC. Containment was expected late last night.

PINEY, George Washington and Jefferson National Forests. This fire is five miles southeast of Glasgow, VA. A burnout operation was successfully completed. Containment was expected late last night.

OUTLOOK:

*** A RED FLAG WARNING IS POSTED IN THE NORTH, EAST AND CENTRAL PORTIONS OF NEW MEXICO AND ALL OF WEST TEXAS FOR STRONG SOUTHWEST WINDS AND LOW RELATIVE HUMIDITIES TODAY ***

New Mexico will be partly cloudy and cooler. There is a chance of showers over the northern mountains, while the south will be mostly sunny. Afternoon winds will be southwest to west at 20 to 35. High temperatures will be in the 60's to lower 70's in the north and in the mid 90's in the southern deserts. Minimum relative humidities will be 10 to 25 percent.

West Texas will be partly cloudy and windy. Winds will be southwest at 15 to 25 mph with gusts to 40 mph. High temperatures will be in the 80's to mid 90's. Minimum relative humidities will be 10 to 15 percent.

Northern Arizona will be partly cloudy with a chance of showers over the mountains. The southern part of the state will be mostly sunny. Winds will be southwest to northwest at 10 to 25 mph. High temperatures will be in the 60's in the mountains and up to the lower 90's in the southern deserts. Minimum relative humidities will be 9 to 20 percent.

Florida will be partly cloudy with east to south winds at 5 to 15 mph. High temperatures will be in the mid 80's to lower 90's. Afternoon relative humidities will be 35 to 45 percent.

North and South Carolina will be mostly cloudy with a chance of afternoon showers and thunderstorms. Winds will be southeast to south at 5 to 15 mph. High temperatures will be in the 70's and 80's.

Virginia will be partly cloudy with south winds of 10 to 20 mph. There is a chance of showers and thunderstorms over the highlands. Maximum temperatures will be in the mid 70's to lower 80's.
