

INCIDENT MANAGEMENT SITUATION REPORT  
TUESDAY, AUGUST 28, 2001 - 0530 MDT  
NATIONAL PREPAREDNESS LEVEL 5

CURRENT SITUATION:

Eight new large fires were reported, five in the Northern Rockies, and one each in Eastern Great Basin, Rocky Mountain and Western Great Basin. Three large fires reached containment, one each in Southern California, Northern Rockies and Northwest Areas. Initial attack activity remains light nationwide. Very high to extreme fire danger was reported in Arizona, California, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, Texas, Utah, Washington and Wyoming.

The California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection confirmed the mid-air collision of two of their Grumman S-2 aircraft yesterday afternoon. The aircraft were making aerial retardant drops on the Bus fire near the town of Hopland, CA in Mendocino County. Both pilots were fatally injured. The National Transportation Safety Board has been notified.

NORTHERN ROCKIES AREA LARGE FIRES:

Priorities are being established by the Northern Rockies Multi-Agency Coordinating Group based on information submitted via Wildland Fire Situation Analysis reports and Incident Status Summary (ICS-209) forms.

FRIDLEY, Gallatin National Forest. A Type 1 Incident Management Team (Frye) is assigned. This fire is 15 miles southwest of Livingston, MT. Structure protection measures remain in place. Aerial retardant drops and extensive helicopter water drops were utilized to support crews with fireline construction. Crews continue to make good progress with construction of containment lines. Local road closures remain in effect.

LITTLE JOE, Gallatin National Forest. A Type 2 Incident Management Team (Joki) is assigned. This fire is ten miles northwest of Gardiner, MT. A patrol cabin in Yellowstone National Park was lost. Crews continue with structure protection.

MOOSE, Flathead National Forest. A Type 2 Incident Management Team (Houseman) is assigned and a Type 1 Incident Management Team (Humphrey) has been ordered. This fire is 13 miles north of Whitefish, MT. Extreme fire behavior was experienced with crown fires and torching.

EAR, Flathead National Forest. A Type 2 Incident Management Team (Kechter) is assigned. This fire is 35 miles southeast of Columbia Falls, MT. Yesterday afternoon the fire jumped an avalanche chute on the west flank which was being utilized as a natural barrier, and burned about 50 acres. Helicopter water drops and aerial retardant are being utilized to slow the fire spread.

MONUMENT, Gallatin National Forest. A Fire Use Management Team (Adams) is assigned. This lightning caused Wildland Fire Use fire is in Sweet Grass County, MT in the Absaroka Beartooth Wilderness Area. An evacuation plan

has been completed and is being coordinated by Sweet Grass County and local law enforcement.

SULPHUR, Yellowstone National Park. This lightning caused Wildland Fire Use fire is ten miles southeast of Canyon Village, WY. This fire is being managed within Yellowstone National Park Parkwide Complex which includes the Stone and Sulphur fires. Aerial and ground resource continue to monitor these fires.

TOBOGGAN, Flathead National Forest. This lightning caused Wildland Fire Use fire is 25 miles east of Bigfork, MT.

BERGSICKE, Flathead National Forest. This lightning caused Wildland Fire Use fire is 26 miles east of Bigfork, MT.

CANNON, Flathead National Forest. This lightning caused Wildland Fire Use fire is 25 miles southeast of Bigfork, MT.

LONG, Flathead National Forest. This lightning caused Wildland Fire Use fire is 29 miles east of Bigfork, MT.

#### NORTHWEST AREA LARGE FIRES:

An Area Command Team (Mann) is assigned to manage the Virginia, Icicle, Spruce Springs/Dome, and Tonasket complexes in eastern Washington. Priorities are being established by the Northwest Multi-Agency Coordinating Group based on information submitted via Wildland Fire Situation Analysis reports and Incident Status Summary (ICS-209) forms.

VIRGINIA LAKE COMPLEX, Colville Agency, BIA. A Type 1 Incident Management Team (Lohrey) is assigned. U.S. Army Task Force Phoenix Blaze, commanded by LTC Ronald Huther at Ft. Lewis, WA, is assigned. This complex, comprised of the St. Mary's, Goose Lake, Brewster, Gambol Mill, Bailey Mountain, and Virginia Lake fires, is 12 miles south of Okanogan, WA. Fireline construction and mopup operations are continuing on the St. Mary, Brewster and Bailey Mountain fires. Rehabilitation efforts are beginning on the Virginia Lake fire.

MT. LEONA COMPLEX, Colville National Forest. A Type 1 Incident Management Team (Stutler) is assigned. This fire is 13 miles northwest of Republic, WA. With higher temperatures and lower relative humidity, fire activity has increased with spot fires occurring outside the containment lines. Crews continue with direct attack on the east flank.

REX CREEK COMPLEX, Wenatchee National Forest. A Type 1 Incident Management Team (Gelobter) and a Type 2 Incident Management Team (Rios) are assigned. This complex, comprised of the Rex Creek, Glory Mountain, and four other fires, is 34 miles northwest of Lake Chelan, WA in the Sawtooth Wilderness Area. Crews continue to mopup hot spots with the assistance of helicopter water drops.

WINDY-SWAMP COMPLEX, Okanogan National Forest. A Type 2 Incident Management Team (Johnson) is assigned. This complex is near Tonasket, WA in the Pasayten Wilderness Area. Crews continue with mopup operations on the Windy Peak fire employing minimum impact suppression techniques. Reinforcement of fireline and mopup on the Long Swamp fire continues.

SLEEPY COMPLEX, Colville National Forest. A Type 1 Incident Management Team (Raley) is assigned. This complex, consisting of the Sleepy and Buckhorn fires, is 24 miles northwest of Inchelium, WA. Crews continue with fireline construction. Crews quickly contained a slopover on one division.

#### EASTERN GREAT BASIN LARGE FIRES:

ROUGH DIAMONDS, Lower Snake River District, BLM. A Type 2 Incident Management Team (Murphy) is on order. This fire is three miles northeast of Silver City, ID. The fire made dramatic runs along the south and west flanks. A strike team of structure protection engines was mobilized to Silver City and residents have been notified of possible evacuation contingency plans. The main access road to Silver City has been closed due to fire runs.

MOLLIE, Uinta National Forest. A Type 1 Incident Management Team (Hefner) transitioned with a Type 3 organization last evening. This fire is 1/4 mile east of Santaquin, UT. Crews are being flown to remote areas and supported on the fireline with helicopter bucket work.

ELK CREEK, Payette National Forest. A Type 2 Incident Management Team (Stanich) is assigned and will transition with a Type 3 organization today. This fire is 15 miles east of Warren, ID. Good progress with

containment efforts were made with the support of air operations.

FALCON, Bridger Teton National Forest. This fire, which began on 8/6 is located in the Teton Wilderness approximately two miles south of Yellowstone National Park. Due to the remoteness of this fire, and safety and logistical support concerns, a confinement strategy has been implemented. Structure protection was put in for two cabins. The fire remains in monitor status.

SNOWSHOE, Salmon-Challis National Forest. This fire, which began on 7/20 is seven miles east of Landmark, ID. The fire continues to make active runs in the Pistol Creek drainage within the parameters of the Wildland Fire Situation Analysis report. Direct suppression tactics are not being utilized.

REPEATER, Ely Field Office, BLM. This fire is five miles west of Ruth, NV. No further information was received.

GRANITE, Great Basin National Park. This fire is 60 miles southeast of Ely, NV. Crews continue to make excellent progress with mopup operations.

ROCKY MOUNTAIN AREA LARGE FIRES:

THOMPSON GULCH, White River Field Office. This fire is 18 miles southwest of Meeker, CO. The fire grew rapidly in heavy pinyon pine, juniper and brush. Oil and gas wells in the immediate area have been shut down. Structure protection is in place.

BOHNSTEAD DRAW, Casper Dispatch Center Counties. This fire burning in pinyon pine, juniper, and sagebrush is seven miles northeast of Guernsey, WY. Moderate fire activity was observed with creeping ground fire and limited torching.

OUTLOOK:

\*\*\* A FIRE WEATHER WATCH HAS BEEN POSTED IN WESTERN PORTIONS OF SOUTHERN MONTANA FORE LOW HUMIDITY, GUSTY WINDS AND DRY THUNDERSTORMS \*\*\*

A cold front will move into the Northern Rockies which will bring partly cloudy skies with a slight chance of dry thunderstorms. High temperatures will be 75 to 85 in the mountains, and 90 to 100 at lower elevations. Minimum relative humidity will range from 10 to 20 percent. Winds will be west to northwest at 10 to 20 mph.

A ridge of high pressure remains entrenched over the Great Basin and western Rockies bringing mostly sunny skies with some isolated, mainly dry thunderstorms over the mountains. High temperatures will be 75 to 85 in the mountains, and upper 80's and 90's at lower elevations. Minimum

relative humidity will range from 2 to 12 percent in Utah, 10 to 20 percent in the valleys and 14 to 28 percent in the mountains of Idaho. Winds will be westerly at 5 to 15 mph except 10 to 20 mph in eastern Idaho.

High pressure continues to strengthen over northern California bringing sunny conditions. High temperatures will be in the 90's to 108 inland. Minimum relative humidity will range from 8 to 18 percent, and winds will be southeast to southwest at 5 to 15 mph.
