

INCIDENT MANAGEMENT SITUATION REPORT
FRIDAY, MAY 12, 2006 0530 MDT
NATIONAL PREPAREDNESS LEVEL 2

CURRENT SITUATION:

Initial attack activity was light nationally with 90 new fires reported. One new large fire (*) was reported in the Western Great Basin Area. One large fire was contained in the Eastern Area. Very high to extreme fire indices were reported in Arizona, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Texas.

SOUTHERN AREA INCIDENTS/LARGE FIRES:

ARECA, Florida Division of Forestry. A Florida State Type 2 Incident Management Team (Jones) is assigned. The Team is also managing the Tosohatchee fire. This fire started on private land six miles northwest of Sharpes, FL in southern rough. State route 528 and Interstate 95 will be shut down as needed due to smoke and fog. Mop-up operations have begun.

WF NEW SMYRNA 44/95, Florida Division of Forestry. This fire is one mile west of New Smyrna, FL in southern rough. Some roads in the area were closed at times due to smoke and fog. Favorable weather has aided containment efforts.

RASELY ROAD, Florida Division of Forestry. A Type 2 Incident Management Team (Beauchamp) is assigned. The team is also managing the WF New Smyrna 44/95 fire. This fire is in Volusia County, FL in southern rough. Smoke and fog are impacting major highways, and Interstate 95 was temporarily closed. Precipitation diminished fire activity.

BERG, Florida Division of Forestry. This fire is 14 miles south of Belle Grade, FL in grass. Burn out operations are continuing. No further information was received.

4 TRACK, Florida Division of Forestry. This fire is 26 miles south of Belle Glade, FL in grass. Smoke is impacting local roadways. Active burning in pockets of fuel with a low rate of spread was reported.

TOSOHATCHEE, Florida Division of Forestry. This fire is six miles southwest of Titusville, FL in timber and southern rough. Difficult access is hampering containment efforts. Smoky conditions and trees falling on local roadways are a concern. Scattered rain fell in the area, reducing fire activity.

BIG BEND, Florida Division of Forestry. This fire is in Osceola County, FL in southern rough. Active fire behavior was reported. No further information was received.

29 POWELL, Florida Division of Forestry. This fire is in Hillsborough County, FL in grass. Interstate 75 is being monitored for smoke and fog. One residence was destroyed. Active burning in pockets of fuel and hurricane debris was reported.

CORBETT TRAIL, Florida Division of Forestry. This fire is four miles south of Indiantown, FL in southern rough. Minimal fire activity was reported. The fire is being monitored.

OUTLOOK:

Red Flag Warnings: In effect for Florida for long durations of low humidities in the mid 20% (in the north) to low 30% (in the south) along with gusty winds up to 25 mph. Red Flag Warnings are also posted for southwest Texas for low humidities in the upper teens and gusty winds to 18 mph.

Weather Discussion: Much drier air will spread into Florida. Hot and dry weather will persist over the Southwest while a low pressure system brings rain to the Great Lakes and Northeast.
