Wenatchee Complex (9 fires), Okanogan/Wenatchee NF. IMT 1 (Pendleton). Two miles west of Wenatchee, WA. Timber, brush and grass. Active fire behavior with spotting and isolated torching. Numerous residences threatened. Evacuations in effect.

Table Mountain (5 fires), Okanogan/Wenatchee NF. IMT 2 (Reed) and IMT 1 (Morcom). Sixteen miles east of Cle Elum, WA. Timber, logging slash, brush and grass. Backing fire with torching. Numerous structures threatened. Evacuations and road closures in effect.

Okanogan Complex (4 fires), Okanogan/Wenatchee NF. IMT 2 (Williams). Eight miles southeast of Carlton, WA. Timber. Active fire behavior with group tree torching and short-range spotting. Numerous structures threatened. Evacuations in effect.

Pole Creek, Deschutes NF. IMT 2 (Watts). Six miles southwest of Sisters, OR. Timber. Moderate fire activity. Numerous residences threatened.

Yakima Complex, Okanogan/Wenatchee NF. IMT 2 (Johnson). Seventeen miles northwest of Ellensburg, WA. Timber, logging slash, brush and grass. Active fire behavior with group tree torching and short-range spotting. Residences threatened.

Cascade Creek, Gifford Pinchot NF. IMT 2 (LaFave). Eight miles north of Trout Lake, WA. Timber. Crown fire.

Bear Slide, Warm Springs Agency, BIA. Five miles northeast of Warm Springs, OR. Brush and grass. No new information.

Trail 2, Warm Springs Agency, BIA. Eleven miles southwest of Warm Springs, OR. Timber and grass. No new information.

Condon Mountain, Flathead NF. IMT 2 (Pearson). Five miles northeast of Condon, MT. Timber. Active fire behavior with short duration crown runs and short-range spotting. Residences threatened. Trail closures in effect.

Wesley, Payette NF. IMT 1 (Lund). Twelve miles northwest of New Meadows, ID. Timber. Backing fire with torching and spotting. Structures threatened.

Karney, Southwest Area Office, IDL. IMT 2 (Wilde). Started on private land eight miles northeast of Boise, ID. Timber, brush and grass. Smoldering.

Chall Creek, Bridger-Teton NF. Thirty miles west of Pinedale, WY. Timber and heavy logging slash. Creeping and smoldering.

Mustang Complex (6 fires), Salmon-Challis NF. IMT 1 (Sciacca). Three miles northwest of North Fork, ID. Timber, brush and grass. Creeping and smoldering with isolated torching. Numerous structures threatened.

Horsethief Canyon, Teton County. IMT 2 (Ourada). Five miles south of Jackson, WY. Timber, brush and grass. Minimal fire activity. Numerous residences, communications site and Snow King Ski Resort threatened.

Halstead, Salmon-Challis NF. Transfer of command from IMT 2 (Adell) back to local unit will occur today. Eighteen miles northwest of Stanley, ID. Timber and grass. Active fire behavior with torching. Structures threatened. Area closures in effect.

Trinity Ridge, Boise NF. Seven miles northwest of Featherville, ID. Timber. Isolated torching. Structures threatened. Area and trail closures in effect. Last report unless significant activity occurs.

Predictive Services Discussion: An upper low will cross through the Northwest, producing isolated to widely scattered thunderstorms across central and eastern Oregon and Washington. Dry and warm conditions will continue over the remainder of the West. A cold front dropping into the deep South will usher in much cooler weather to the most of the central and eastern U.S. Scattered showers and a few thunderstorms will form over the Great Lakes, New England and the mid-Atlantic. The Gulf coast states will remain warm and dry.

Today's discussion is from the Weather / Fire Behavior Category.

BASE ALL ACTIONS ON CURRENT AND EXPECTED FIRE BEHAVIOR

- Can the resources you are replacing give you a thorough briefing? What information will you want to get from resources you are replacing?
- Can you observe the area or use scouts? What information are the scouts looking for?
- Have escape routes and safety zones been thoroughly scouted? List some ways your crew will scout out an area before you begin working
- Are escape routes and safety zones marked for night use? How do you adjust marking safety zones and escape routes for night use?
- Have potential dangers been located and can they be dealt with? List some dangerous fire behavior you may encounter and how you would deal with it.
- Do you have access to weather and fire behavior forecasts? What is your unit's procedure for obtaining forecasts?
- To reduce risk, initiate the following:
 - Post lookouts.
 - Check communications.
 - Retreat if you have doubts about your escape routes or safety zones or if the situation becomes too complex. Discuss fires where you have adjusted your actions based on current and expected fire behavior.

How would you judge the fire season? (Above normal, below, or average.)
