Soberanes, San Benito-Monterey Unit, Cal Fire. Cal Fire IMT 1 (Derum) and IMT 1 (Vontillow). Seven miles northwest of Big Sur, CA. Timber, chaparral and tall grass. Moderate fire behavior with short-range spotting, flanking and backing. Numerous structures threatened. Evacuations, road, area and trail closures in effect.

Pilot, San Bernardino, NF. IMT 2 (Wakoski). Three miles west of Lake Arrowhead, CA. Timber, chaparral and brush. Minimal fire behavior with creeping and smoldering. Numerous structures threatened. Road, trail and area closures in effect.

Mineral, Fresno-Kings Unit, Cal Fire. Cal Fire IMT 1 (Gouvea). Nine miles southwest of Coalinga, CA. Brush and grass. Minimal fire behavior with creeping and smoldering. Road closures in effect.

Horseshoe, Inyo NF. IMT 2 (Laeng). Twelve miles southwest of Lone Pine, CA. Timber and brush. Moderate fire behavior. Road closures in effect.

Pioneer, Boise NF. IMT 1 (Wilkins) and IMT 2 (Chadwick). Eight miles north of Idaho City, ID. Timber. Active fire behavior with torching, spotting and uphill runs. Numerous structures threatened. Evacuations, road, area and trail closures in effect.

Strawberry, Great Basin NP. IMT 2 (DeMasters). Started on BLM land five miles west of Baker, NV. Timber, brush and short grass. Active fire behavior with backing, flanking and group torching. Structures threatened. Sage grouse habitat threatened. Road, trail and area closures in effect. Reduction in acreage due to more accurate mapping.

Overland, Ely District Office, BLM. Forty miles northeast of Eureka, NV. Chaparral, brush and short grass. Moderate fire behavior with isolated torching and smoldering. Sage grouse habitat threatened.

Dry Creek, Sawtooth NF. Six miles northwest of Stanley, ID. Timber. Minimal fire behavior with creeping, smoldering and isolated single-tree torching. Trail closures in effect.

Hunter Peak, Shoshone NF. IMT 1 (Pechota). Fifteen miles southeast of Cooke City, MT. Closed timber litter, brush and short grass. Active fire behavior with torching and running. Numerous structures threatened. Evacuations and trail closures in effect.

Twin Lakes, Wind River/Bighorn Basin District, BLM. IMT 2 (Esperance). Forty-five miles south of Cody, WY. Timber, brush and short grass. Active fire behavior with torching, creeping and flanking. Residences threatened. Road closures in effect.

Beaver Creek, Routt NF. NIMO (Quesinberry). Twenty-four miles north of Walden, CO. Timber and brush. Moderate fire behavior with torching, crowing and creeping. Numerous structures threatened. Sage grouse habitat threatened. Evacuations, road, area and trail closures in effect.

Whit, Park County. Started on BLM land twelve miles west of Cody, WY. Timber, brush and tall grass. Moderate fire behavior with backing, creeping and isolated torching. Trail and area closures in effect.

* **Washakie Park**, Wind River Agency, BIA. Three miles west of Fort Washakie, WY. Brush and short grass. Moderate fire behavior with smoldering and isolated torching. Sage grouse habitat threatened.

Lava Mountain, Shoshone NF. Twenty miles northwest of Dubois, WY. Timber, heavy logging slash and short grass. Minimal fire behavior with creeping and smoldering. Road and trail closures in effect.

Predictive Services Discussion: Rain and thunderstorms will continue across much of the eastern U.S. with heavy rain possible along the western Gulf and over parts of Texas, the Mid-Mississippi Valley and New England. Scattered thunderstorms will also spread along the Rockies Front Range from New Mexico to Colorado. Isolated thunderstorms will develop over the northern Rockies. The western U.S. will remain hot and dry. Mild weather will continue in the Great Lakes region.

REFUSING RISK

Operational Engagement Category

Every firefighter has the right and obligation to report safety problems and contribute ideas regarding their safety. Supervisors are expected to give these concerns and ideas serious consideration. When an individual feels an assignment is unsafe, they also have the obligation to identify, to the degree possible, safe alternatives for completing that assignment. Turning down an assignment is one possible outcome of managing risk.

- A turn down is a situation where an individual has determined an assignment cannot be undertaken as given, and they are unable to negotiate an alternative solution.
- A turn down must be based on an assessment of risks and the ability of an individual or organization to control those risks.
- A situation may be a candidate for a turndown if:
 - There is a violation of safe work practices.
 - Environmental conditions make the work unsafe.
 - The forces lack the necessary qualifications or experience.
 - Defective equipment is being used.
- The following steps will be used when turning down an assignment:
 - The individual will directly inform their supervisor that they are turning down the assignment as given. (Document using criteria outlined in the risk management process.)
 - Supervisor will notify the Safety Officer immediately upon being informed. In the absence of a Safety Officer, the appropriate Section Chief or Incident Commander will be notified. This step provides accountability for decisions and initiates communication of safety concerns.
 - If the supervisor requests another resource to perform the assignment, he/she is responsible for informing that resource that the assignment has previously been refused and the reason(s) why.
 - The safety hazard should be documented by the submission of a SAFENET or SAFECOM.
- These actions do not stop an operation from being carried out. This protocol is integral to the effective management of risk as it provides timely identification of hazards to the chain of command, raises risk awareness for both leaders and subordinates, and promotes accountability.
