Rock Mountain, Chattahoochee-Oconee NF. IMT 1 (Livingston). Two miles south of Tate City, GA. Hardwood litter and timber. Active fire behavior with running, flanking and backing. Numerous structures threatened. Evacuations, road, area and trail closures in effect.

Pinnacle Mountain, South Carolina Forestry Commission. Three miles southeast of Rocky Bottom, SC. Hardwood Litter and timber. Active fire behavior with uphill runs, flanking and isolated torching. Numerous structures threatened. Evacuations, road, area and trail closures in effect.

Party Rock, North Carolina Forest Service. IMT 2 (Brandon). One mile north of Lake Lure, NC. Hardwood litter. Moderate fire behavior with smoldering. Numerous structures threatened. Evacuations, road, area and trail closures in effect.

Tatum Gulf, Georgia Forestry Commission. Eleven miles west of LaFayette, GA. Hardwood litter. Minimal fire behavior with backing. Numerous structures threatened. Road and area closures in effect.

Tellico, National Forests in North Carolina. Transfer of command from IMT 1 (Dueitt) to IMT 1 (Wilkins) will occur today. IMT is also managing the Boteler, Dick's Creek, Muskrat, and Cathy Gap fires. Three miles south of Almond, NC. Hardwood litter, timber and short grass. Minimal fire behavior with creeping and smoldering. Numerous structures threatened. Road and trail closures in effect.

Boteler, National Forests in North Carolina. Nine miles east of Hayesville, NC. Timber and brush. Moderate fire behavior with backing, smoldering and creeping. Numerous structures threatened. Road, area and trail closures in effect.

Dick's Creek, National Forests in North Carolina. Two miles northwest of Sylva, NC. Hardwood litter, short grass and timber. Minimal fire behavior with creeping and smoldering. Structures threatened.

Muskrat, North Carolina Forest Service. Eight miles southwest of Franklin, NC. Hardwood litter and timber. Minimal fire behavior with smoldering.

Cathy Gap, National Forests in North Carolina. Four miles northwest of Balsam Grove, NC. Hardwood litter and timber. Moderate fire behavior with creeping and smoldering. Structures threatened.

Chestnut Knob, North Carolina Forest Service. IMT 2 (Kern). Three miles south of Enola, NC. Hardwood litter. Minimal fire behavior with creeping, backing and smoldering. Numerous structures threatened. Road, area and trail closures in effect.

Maple Springs, National Forests in North Carolina. IMT 2 (Esperance). Three miles northwest of Santeetlah Lake, NC. Hardwood litter, timber and brush. Minimal fire behavior with smoldering and creeping. Structures threatened. Road, area and trail closures in effect.

Rough Ridge, Chattahoochee-Oconee NF. IMT 2 (Fogle). Thirteen miles northwest of Blue Ridge, GA. Hardwood litter, timber and brush. Minimal fire behavior with backing, creeping and smoldering. Structures threatened. Area and trail closures in effect.

East Miller Cove, Tennessee DOF. Started on private land one mile north of Walland, TN. Hardwood litter and southern rough. Moderate fire behavior. Structures threatened.

Eastern Cherokee Complex, Eastern Cherokee Agency, BIA. (2 fires). Four miles east of Cherokee, NC. Hardwood litter. No new information.

Raven Rock, George Washington & Jefferson NF. Started on private land one mile east of Jenkins, KY. Hardwood litter and timber. Minimal fire behavior with smoldering. Trail closures in effect.

Kentucky Ridge, Kentucky DOF. Previously reported incident. One mile northwest of Chenoa, KY. Hardwood litter and timber. Active fire behavior.

* **Bells Road**, Georgia Forestry Commission. Twenty miles southwest of Cedartown, GA. Timber. Extreme fire behavior with crowning, running and spotting. Numerous structures threatened. Evacuations, road and area closures in effect.

* **Mount Pleasant**, George Washington & Jefferson NF. Four miles west of Lowesville, VA. Hardwood litter. Active fire behavior with uphill runs, running and short-range spotting. Structures threatened. Road, area and trail closures in effect. Last report unless significant activity occurs.

Quarry Creek, Cherokee NF. Two miles east of Tellico Plains, TN. Hardwood litter, brush and short grass. Minimal fire behavior with creeping and smoldering. Structures threatened.

* **N. Conventional Range**, Avon Park Air Force Range, DOD. Seven miles southwest of River Ranch, FL. Southern rough. Minimal fire behavior with smoldering. Structures threatened. Last report unless significant activity occurs.

Walters Rd, Kentucky DOF. Two miles northeast of Pikeville, KY. Hardwood litter and timber. Active fire behavior.

Fish Trap, Kentucky DOF. Five miles south of Raccoon, KY. Hardwood litter and timber. Active fire behavior.

* **Clark Rd**, Kentucky DOF. Two miles south of Honaker, KY. Timber and hardwood litter. Active fire behavior.

Oakwood 1, Felsenthal NWR. Six miles east of Dumas, AR. Hardwood litter. No new information.

Big Poplar, Cherokee NF. One mile west of Turtletown, TN. Hardwood litter, closed timber litter and timber. Minimal fire behavior with creeping and smoldering. Area closures in effect.

Hurricane Creek, Kentucky DOF. Three miles southwest of Stopover, KY. Hardwood litter and timber. Active fire behavior.

* **Chimney Rock**, Big South Fork National River and Recreation Area. Thirteen miles northwest of Oneida, TN. Hardwood litter and timber. Moderate fire behavior with backing, flanking and uphill runs.

Predictive Services Discussion: The upper ridge over the central U.S. gradually weakens but a deep upper low remains over the far northeastern U.S. and broad trough moves into the Interior West. Scattered rain and snow showers will remain over New England. Rain and mountain snow will spread across the western U.S. Windy conditions will develop over the Plains. Cold conditions will continue over the most of the northern half of the U.S. and the West. Warm to very warm weather will remain over the Gulf states and the far Southwest.

THUNDERSTORM SAFETY

Weather / Fire Behavior Category

Thunderstorms cause significant hazards for wildland firefighters, including downbursts that can cause extreme fire behavior and lightning. When thunderstorm development is likely, lookouts should be posted and aware of signs of a developing storm. A sudden reversal in wind direction, a noticeable rise in wind speed, and a sharp drop in temperature may note the mature stage of a storm. Heavy rain, hail and lightning occur only in the mature stage of a thunderstorm. During a storm, use the following guidelines:

- Do not lie down.
 - The best position is sitting on the pack or crouching with feet close together.
 - Avoid sitting directly on the ground, if possible; but, if necessary, keep feet and butt close together.
 - Avoid grouping together. Keep a minimum of 15 feet between people when possible.
 - Removing caulk boots will not provide safety if stocking covered or bare feet are then in contact with the ground--don't bother!
- "Stay out of dry creek beds" is correct for flash floods, but has nothing to do with lightning.
- Handheld radios (with short rubber antennas) or cell phones are safe to use. Communication is vital to crew safety. Do not use land line radios or radios with elevated antennas.
- Wide, open spaces are better than trees or clumps of trees in the vicinity. Ridge tops, etc., should be avoided.
- If you feel the hair on your arms or head "stand up," there is a high probability of a strike in the vicinity. Crouch or sit on a pack.
- Put down all tools.
- Take shelter in vehicles if possible.
