Bringham, Apache-Sitgreaves NF, USFS. IMT 2 (SW Team 4) mobilizing. Twenty-five miles north of Morenci, AZ. Brush and timber litter. Active fire behavior with uphill runs, backing and single tree torching. Structures threatened. Road, trail and area closures in effect. Precipitation occurred over the fire area yesterday.

Bighorn, Coronado NF, USFS. IMT 1 (SW Team 2). Five miles northeast of Tucson, AZ. Brush, tall grass and hardwood slash. Active fire behavior with uphill runs, group torching and flanking. Numerous structures threatened. Evacuations, trail and area closures in effect.

Mangum, Kaibab NF, USFS. IMT 2 (SW Team 3). Twenty-four miles southeast of Fredonia, AZ. Timber, brush and short grass. Extreme fire behavior with short crown runs, torching and long-range spotting. Numerous structures and energy infrastructure threatened. Evacuations, road, trail and area closures in effect.

Tadpole, Gila NF, USFS. Twelve miles north of Silver City, NM. Timber, brush and chaparral. Active fire behavior with uphill runs, flanking and backing. Structures threatened. Road, trail and area closures in effect.

Blue River, San Carlos Agency, BIA. Eight miles northeast of San Carlos, AZ. Brush and tall grass. Moderate fire behavior with isolated torching, creeping and backing. Structures threatened.

Dry Lake, San Carlos Agency, BIA. Thirty-four miles east of San Carlos, AZ. Brush, tall grass and timber. Moderate fire behavior with backing, creeping and smoldering. Structures threatened.

Farm Camp, Las Vegas District, New Mexico State Forestry Division. Five miles southeast of Mosquero, NM. Tall grass. Moderate fire behavior.

Good, Gila NF, USFS. Twenty-nine miles north of Silver City, NM. Timber, brush and tall grass. Moderate fire behavior with backing, creeping and smoldering.

Sawtooth, Tonto NF, USFS. Seven miles northwest of Superior, AZ. Brush and short grass. No new information.

Emigrant, Coronado NF, USFS. Twenty-five miles southeast of Willcox, AZ. Brush and tall grass. Minimal fire behavior with smoldering. Residences threatened.

Predictive Services Discussion: Critical fire weather conditions will continue across southern Utah and Arizona as a cold front passes to the north. Breezy southwesterly winds will interact with low humidities to maintain a favorable burning environment. Scattered showers and storms will be possible across the northern Great Basin and northern Rockies as the front continues to move east. Drying conditions are expected along the West Coast as a weak high pressure ridge begins to build inland. In Alaska, scattered convection will continue across the Central Interior but will be less widespread than what was observed previous days. In the East, no significant fire weather-related conditions are expected.

Fight Fire Aggressively, But Provide For Safety First

Operational Engagement Category

Standard Fire Order #10 must be taken into account at all times when fighting fire. In order to fight fire safely and aggressively, every firefighter must be able to answer the following questions:

- Is the suppression method adequate? Ask yourselves, are we making progress? Are we beating our heads against a wall? Is there a better way to get this done? Give examples when you have had to change your suppression method.
- Are there adequate resources and time for effective suppression? Ask yourselves, do we need to retreat and reevaluate? Talk about times when you have realized you weren't getting anywhere and needed to retreat and start managing firefighters and placing orders.
- Are lookouts posted? Discuss when you post lookouts, who you would choose to be a lookout, and where they should be located.
- Are communications prompt with crews and other resources? Review the importance of good communications on the fireline.
- Have escape routes and safety zones been established? Talk about your crew's procedure for establishing escape routes and safety zones. Review what constitutes an escape route and a safety zone.
- Do you feel comfortable with your assignment? Discuss the situation check. Remind firefighters that every individual has the right to question an assignment.
- To reduce the risks:
 - Post lookouts.
 - Retreat if the situation is too complex. Emphasize that safety is everyone's responsibility; we all want to be good firefighters and being safe is part of that.
 - Do you have established trigger points?
