NIMO (Houseman) has been assigned to COVID-19 support at Forest Service headquarters in Washington, D.C.

NIMO (Reinarz) has been assigned to provide wildland fire support to California.

NIMO (Day) has been assigned to provide wildland fire support to federal land management agencies in Oregon and Washington.

Two hundred thirty-four Marines from the 7th Engineer Support Battalion, 1st Marine Logistics Group, 1 Marine Expeditionary Force based out of Camp Pendleton, California are deployed in support of the Creek fire.

Two MAFFS C-130 airtankers and support personnel from the 146th Airlift Wing (California Air National Guard) and one MAFFS C-130 airtanker and support personnel from each the 153rd Airlift Wing (Wyoming Air National Guard) and the 152nd Airlift Wing (Nevada Air National Guard) have been deployed to support wildland fire operations in California.

Seven fire suppression crews and four overhead personnel from Canada are supporting fire suppression efforts in northern California.

Six fire suppression crews, 15 fire engines and 14 overhead personnel from Canada are supporting fire suppression efforts in Oregon.

Five fire suppression crews and four overhead personnel from Mexico are supporting fire suppression efforts in southern California.

Glass, Sonoma-Lake Napa Unit, Cal Fire. IMT 1 (Cal Fire Team 3). Thirteen miles northwest of Napa, CA. Tall grass, brush and timber. Active fire behavior with uphill runs, short-range spotting and flanking. Several communities and infrastructure threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

August Complex (2 fires), Mendocino NF, USFS. Transfer of command from Area Command Team (Jalbert) to Area Command Team (Sexton) will occur today. IMT 1 (AK Team 1) and IMT 1 (PNW Team 2). IMT 1 (SW Team 1) and IMT 1 (GB Team 2) mobilizing. Fourteen miles northwest of Elk Creek, CA. Timber, chaparral and tall grass. Extreme fire behavior with group torching, crowning and running. Several communities and infrastructure threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

August Complex West Zone, Mendocino Unit, Cal Fire. IMT 1 (Cal Fire Team 5). Four miles northeast of Covelo, CA. Timber, chaparral and tall grass. Moderate fire behavior with backing, creeping and isolated torching. Several communities and communication infrastructure threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

North Complex, Plumas NF, USFS. IMT 1 (CA Team 4) and IMT 2 (RM Team Black). One mile southwest of Crescent Mills, CA. Timber and brush. Active fire behavior with creeping, torching and spotting. Several communities and infrastructure threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

Zogg, Shasta-Trinity Unit, Cal Fire. IMT 1 (Cal Fire Team 2). Nine miles southwest of Redding, CA. Chaparral, brush and short grass. Minimal fire behavior with creeping and smoldering. Numerous residences threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

Slater, Klamath NF, USFS. Transfer of command from IMT 1(NR Team 2) to IMT 2 (NW Team 7) will occur today. IMT is also managing the Devil fire. Five miles northeast of Happy Camp, CA. Timber and brush. Moderate fire behavior with backing, flanking and single tree torching. Several communities and communication infrastructure threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

Devil, Klamath NF, USFS. Five miles north of Seiad, CA. Timber. Moderate fire behavior with backing, flanking and single tree torching. Area and trail closures in effect.

Red Salmon Complex (2 fires), Six Rivers NF, USFS. IMT 2 (NW Team 10). Fourteen miles northeast of Willow Creek, CA. Timber and closed timber litter. Active fire behavior with uphill runs, running and short-range spotting. Several communities and communication infrastructure threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

Fork, Eldorado NF, USFS. Fifteen miles northeast of Pollock Pines, CA. Timber and brush. No new information.

Creek, Sierra NF, USFS. IMT 1 (CA Team 5) and IMT 2 (NR Team 4). Thirty-five miles northeast of Clovis, CA. Timber, chaparral and tall grass. Active fire behavior with uphill runs, backing and short-range spotting. Several communities and infrastructure threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

SQF Complex (2 fires), Sequoia NF, USFS. IMT 1 (CA Team 2) and IMT 1 (Cal Fire Team 6). Thirty-three miles east of Porterville, CA. Timber and chaparral. Active fire behavior with flanking, backing and spotting. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

Bobcat, Angeles NF, USFS. IMT 2 (CA Team 11). Twelve miles northeast of Pasadena, CA. Chaparral, brush and tall grass. Minimal fire behavior with backing, creeping and smoldering. Numerous structures and infrastructure threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

Dolan, Los Padres NF, USFS. IMT 2 (CA Team 15). Ten miles south of Big Sur, CA. Brush, chaparral and short grass. Moderate fire behavior with backing, flanking and creeping. Several communities threatened. Area, road and trail closures in effect.

El Dorado, San Bernardino Unit, Cal Fire. Three miles northeast of Yucaipa, CA. Timber, chaparral and brush. Minimal fire behavior with creeping, backing and smoldering. Numerous structures threatened. Area and trail closures in effect.

Moraine, Sequoia & Kings Canyon NP, NPS. Five miles northeast of Kanawyers, CA. Timber and brush. Minimal fire behavior with backing, creeping and smoldering.

Cameron Peak, Arapaho and Roosevelt NF and Pawnee National Grassland, USFS. IMT 2 (NW Team 6). Fifteen miles southwest of Redfeather Lakes, CO. Timber. Active fire behavior with flanking, group torching and backing. Several communities threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

Mullen, Medicine Bow-Routt NF and Thunder Basin National Grassland, USFS. IMT 2 (RM Team Blue). IMT 1 (SA Blue Team) mobilizing. Thirty-eight miles west of Laramie, WY. Timber. Extreme fire behavior with short crown runs and spotting. Several communities and communication infrastructure threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

Williams Fork, Arapaho and Roosevelt NF and Pawnee National Grassland, USFS. IMT 2 (NR Team 6). Fifteen miles southwest of Fraser, CO. Timber. Moderate fire behavior with backing, short-range spotting and isolated torching. Several communities and infrastructure threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

Gibbons, Pine Ridge Agency, BIA. Fifteen miles north of Pine Ridge, SD. Timber and tall grass. Active fire behavior with creeping and running. Residences threatened.

Middle Fork, Medicine Bow-Routt NF and Thunder Basin National Grassland, USFS. Ten miles north of Steamboat Springs, CO. Timber. Moderate fire behavior with isolated torching, flanking and backing. Area and trail closures in effect.

Riverside, Mt. Hood NF, USFS. One mile southeast of Estacada, OR. Timber. Minimal fire behavior with smoldering. Infrastructure threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

Lionshead, Warm Springs Agency, BIA. IMT 2 (NW Team 13). Twenty miles west of Warm Springs, OR. Timber and brush. Moderate fire behavior with backing, creeping and smoldering. Several communities threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

OR-WIF-200430, Willamette NF, USFS. IMT 1 (ODF Team 1). Thirty-five miles east of Eugene, OR. Timber and brush. Minimal fire behavior with smoldering, creeping and backing. Road, area and trail closures in effect.

Predictive Services Discussion: A weak mid-level trough will flatten the ridge over the Pacific Northwest late today with a thermal trough extending through California and into Inland Pacific Northwest. AAR part 1

Fire Communication Category

How to conduct an effective After Action Review

An AAR is a professional discussion of an event with the objective to identify successes and failures. It is a tool that leaders, teams, crews, and units can use to get the maximum benefit from every incident or project. It is essential for wildland firefighters to learn from our mistakes and to capitalize on our successes. It is considered a valuable tool in high-risk professions where the smallest mistakes can lead to disastrous results. ***FYI – an AAR is not a critique and not a forum to assign blame. It's an open, honest, and professional discussion for purposes of improvement.***

Once you (the leader/facilitator) have demonstrated that the AAR works and that it will be part of your team's Standard Operating Procedures, the discussion will become more open. Finding out *what* they did is not nearly as important as *why* they did it. Good active listening skills are essential. Do not immediately try to solve or correct the issue, but let it play out. Try to get to the root of the issue. The leader must be a part of the AAR and will have to accept criticism. This is important because the team will be looking for affirmation of the AAR process.

- Have the AAR as soon after an event as possible with all the personnel involved if at all possible.
- The leader's role is to ensure there is skilled facilitation of the AAR.
- Make sure everyone participates.
- Pay attention to time.
- Establish clear ground rules: encourage candor and openness, all participants have equal ownership, focus on improving performance, and keep all discussions confidential.
- End on a positive note.

1. What was planned?

Review the intent of the mission.

Desired "End State" (what does "Right" look like).

2. What actually happened?

Establish the facts.

Pool multiple perspectives to build a shared picture of what happened.

3. Why did it happen?

Analysis of cause and effect.

Focus on WHAT, not WHO.

Provide progressive refinement for drawing out explanations of what occurred.

4. What are we going to do next time?

Correct weaknesses.

Focus on items you can fix, rather than external forces outside of your control.
