**Rum Creek**, Medford District, BLM. IMT 1 (ODF Team 1) and IMT 2 (NW Team 13). IMT 2 (NR Team 6) mobilizing. Twelve miles northwest of Hugo, OR. Timber and closed timber litter. Active fire behavior with uphill runs, flanking and backing. Numerous structures threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

**Double Creek**, Wallowa-Whitman NF, USFS. IMT 1 (PNW Team 2). Ten miles southeast of Imnaha, OR. Timber and short grass. Active fire behavior with wind-driven runs, group torching and spotting. Structures threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

**Cedar Creek**, Willamette NF, USFS. IMT 2 (NW Team 6). Fifteen miles east of Oakridge, OR. Timber and closed timber litter. Moderate fire behavior with flanking, backing and torching. Structures threatened. Area, road and trail closures in effect.

**White River**, Okanogan-Wenatchee NF, USFS. IMT 2 (NW Team 8). IMT is also managing the Irving Peak fire. Twenty-three miles northwest of Leavenworth, WA. Timber. Active fire behavior with flanking, backing and torching. Numerous structures threatened. Area, road and trail closures in effect.

**Irving Peak**, Okanogan-Wenatchee NF, USFS. Twenty-six miles northwest of Leavenworth, WA. Timber. Active fire behavior with flanking, backing and isolated torching. Structures threatened. Area, road and trail closures in effect.

**Crocks Knob**, Malheur NF, USFS. IMT 2 (NW Team 12). Nineteen miles north of Prairie City, OR. Brush and timber. Active fire behavior with uphill runs, flanking and group torching. Structures threatened. Area, road and trail closures in effect.

**Boulder Mountain**, Northeast Region, DNR. IMT 2 (GB Team 7). Started on private land nine miles northwest of Cusick, WA. Timber. Active fire behavior with flanking, backing and isolated torching. Structures threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

**Windigo**, Umpqua NF, USFS. IMT 2 (NW Team 9). IMT is also managing the Potter and Big Swamp fires. Twenty miles southwest of La Pine, OR. Closed timber litter, timber and medium slash. Minimal fire behavior with creeping and smoldering. Area, road and trail closures in effect.

**Potter**, Willamette NF, USFS. Forty-six miles southwest of La Pine, OR. Closed timber litter, timber and medium slash. Minimal fire behavior with creeping and isolated torching. Area, road and trail closures in effect.

**Big Swamp**, Willamette NF, USFS. Thirty-seven miles southwest of La Pine, OR. Closed timber litter, timber and medium slash. Minimal fire behavior with smoldering. Area, road and trail closures in effect.

**Nebo**, Wallowa-Whitman NF, USFS. Previously reported incident. Twenty-one miles southeast of Enterprise, OR. Timber. Active fire behavior with short crown runs, flanking and spotting. Last narrative report unless significant activity occurs.

**Sturgill**, Wallowa-Whitman NF, USFS. Previously reported incident. Fifteen miles southwest of Enterprise, OR. Timber and closed timber litter. Active fire behavior with wind-driven runs, flanking and backing. Last narrative report unless significant activity occurs.

**Mill**, Siskiyou Unit, Cal Fire. IMT 1 (Cal Fire Team 5). IMT is also managing the Mountain fire. One mile northeast of Weed, CA. Short grass, brush and timber. Minimal fire behavior with smoldering, creeping and backing. Numerous structures threatened. Evacuations and road closures in effect.

**Mountain**, Siskiyou Unit, Cal Fire. Thirteen miles southeast of Etna, CA. Short grass, brush and timber. Active fire behavior with uphill runs, flanking and short crown runs. Numerous structures threatened. Evacuations and road closures in effect.

**2022 SRF Lightning Complex** (2 fires), Six Rivers NF, USFS. IMT 2 (CA Team 15) and NIMO (Team 4). One mile northeast of Willow Creek, CA. Timber and slash. Active fire behavior with isolated torching, backing and flanking. Several communities, numerous structures and infrastructure threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

**Predictive Services Discussion:** Elevated to critical fire weather conditions are likely from northeast California through southern Idaho into western and central Wyoming, central and eastern Montana, and the western Dakotas. Locally elevated conditions are also possible in portions of western Montana. Westerly sustained winds of 15-20 mph gusting 25-40 mph amid minimum relative humidity of 5-20% are expected across these areas. Hot, dry, and unstable conditions will continue across much of the West as well, with temperatures mostly in the 90s to low 100s and minimum relative humidity generally below 20%, including much of central and northern California and the Great Basin with single digit relative humidity. Isolated to scattered thunderstorms are likely over northern and western Arizona into southern Nevada and southern California, including some storms capable of severe wind. Mostly scattered thunderstorms are likely across the Southeast into the Northeast and Texas.

# Chainsaw Safety

*Felling Safety Category*

## **Chainsaw safety is every saw operator's job.**

- Always wear proper personal protective equipment (PPE) when handling or working around chainsaws.
  - Eye protection – approved goggles or safety glasses.
  - Hearing protection – earplugs or muffs.
  - Helmet.
  - Chainsaw Chaps – proper size and length.
  - Gloves – proper size.
  - Long sleeve shirt – no loose sleeves.
  - Leather boots – no loose boot laces.
- Take the time to inspect the chainsaw before operating the saw.
  - Check the chain and bar – sharpness of chain, bar seated correctly.
  - Check the bolts and screws all around the saw – no missing screws or bolts.
  - Check the casing of the saw – no cracked or missing plastic.
  - Felling axe and wedges in good condition.
  - Saw gas and bar oil in sufficient quantities to meet objectives.
  - Basic saw maintenance tools on site and specific to saw in use.
  - Review fuel geysering indicators/potential.
- Make sure you're aware of your surroundings while operating the chainsaw.
  - Look for and anticipate people working in your area – the chainsaw operator is responsible for controlling the cutting area and communicating with others in the cutting area.
  - Look for any snags or overhead hazards in your area – maintain recommended spacing of falling teams or others working in the cutting area.
  - Establish consistent communications with spotters/swampers – always minimize personnel working directly at the stump or in the felling area.
  - Are there other risk factors that increase the complexity of the job – loose soils, rocky ground, steep terrain, weather factors or poor visibility, tree condition, others?
- Complete a personal Risk Assessment to determine if you are comfortable completing the task at hand – don't let job performance pressure force you in over your skill level.
  - Proper training and certification level for personnel running saws and assisting with saw operations.
  - Describe your medical response plan and how it is implemented, including extricating a severe injury at the worksite.
  - If you are not comfortable falling the tree, walk away. Notify your supervisor and mitigate the safety issues or turn down the assignment.
