Chris Mountain, San Juan NF, USFS. CIMT (RM Team 3). Six miles northwest of Pagosa Springs, CO. Timber and brush. Moderate fire behavior with creeping, isolated torching and smoldering. Structures threatened. Area, road and trail closures in effect.

Coal Mine, Archuleta County. Eighteen miles south of Pagosa Springs, CO. Timber and brush. Minimal fire behavior with smoldering.

Arkansas Loop, Southern Ute Agency, BIA. Twelve miles west of Tiffany, CO. Timber and brush. Minimal fire behavior with smoldering.

Brushy, Socorro District, New Mexico State Forestry. Thirty miles south of Animas, NM. Grass and brush. Moderate fire behavior with flanking, creeping and backing.

Pilot, Northwest District, Arizona DOF. Twenty miles east of Wikiup, AZ. Grass and brush. Active fire behavior with uphill runs, wind-driven runs and flanking. Structures threatened.

West Main, Central District, Arizona DOF. Seven miles northeast of Yuma, AZ. Brush. Minimal fire behavior with smoldering. Area closures in effect.

Predictive Services Discussion:

Dry and windy conditions will continue across parts of southeast California, the southern Great Basin, western Colorado, and northern portions of the Southwest leading to elevated and critical fire weather conditions. Hot, dry, and unstable conditions will continue across parts of the Desert Southwest and Pacific Northwest. Isolated dry thunderstorms are possible in far northern California into southern Oregon, southern and central Idaho, and northern Nevada as well as in the north Cascades into northwest Montana. Isolated to scattered thunderstorms are likely in much of the Rockies, along and east of the Divide, while severe thunderstorms are likely on much of the central Plains into portions of the northern and southern Plains. Scattered to widespread thunderstorms are expected along the Gulf Coast through much of the Southeast, Mid-Atlantic, eastern Great Lakes, and Northeast. Gusty southerly winds through the Alaska Range with warmer and drier conditions in the eastern Interior into the Alaska Panhandle will continue.
