Hurricane Helene Support – NC, North Carolina Forest Service. CIMT (NC State). Primary mission is to coordinate emergency road clearing efforts, perform damage assessments and deliver commodities throughout western North Carolina.

Rush, Wichita Mountains National Wildlife Refuge, FWS. CIMT (SA Team 1). Fifteen miles northwest of Lawton, OK. Timber, grass and brush. Minimal fire behavior with backing, creeping and smoldering. Numerous structures threatened. Area, road and trail closures in effect.

Predictive Services Discussion:

A weakening cold front will move through the Appalachians and off the East Coast, while stalling in the Lower Mississippi Valley. Light showers are possible with the front on the west slopes of the Appalachians and in northern New England, while breezy and dry post-frontal winds develop in portions of the Mid-Atlantic and southern New England for elevated fire weather conditions. Southerly return flow off the Gulf of Mexico will bring increased moisture to the southern Plains, with extensive cloud cover and scattered to widespread showers. A cold front will move into the northwestern US with widespread precipitation, falling as snow above 4,000 to 6,000 feet, with the heaviest rain and snow in the Cascades westward to the coast. Breezy and dry westerly winds will develop well ahead of the front in the Great Basin, central Rockies, and Southwest.
