Predictive Services Discussion:

Upper-level low pressure will shift inland across the West and weaken today, but showers and thunderstorms with abundant lightning will continue in association with the remnant disturbance. Southwesterly flow will increase farther south and east amid a rapidly drying fire environment, resulting in critical fire weather for portions of the Great Basin, Southwest, and Rocky Mountain geographic areas. The monsoon will essentially shut down today, while showers and thunderstorms will be concentrated across most of the Mississippi Valley as the Plains and Southeast trend dry and very hot. Alaska will see drier, breezy and warmer conditions with low pressure exiting to the south.

Scattered mixed wet/dry thunderstorms will continue in the same areas as Friday, extending from the mountains of northern California into southwestern Montana. Erratic wind gusts over 50 mph will be possible where thunderstorms are drier over the Interior. Storms will tend to be wetter in California after a couple of days of scattered rainfall, but storm motions will be a bit faster as winds aloft increase. The hit-and-miss nature of wetting rain Thursday and Friday may allow for lightning ignitions in drier spots throughout the region, but new fires will be more likely from western and northern Nevada into Idaho and perhaps far southwest Montana. A few dry thunderstorms may pop up over Wyoming and Colorado, where it will otherwise be hot and dry.

Quickly drying fuels will be exposed to critical fire weather from southern Nevada into northern Arizona, Utah, western Colorado and southwestern Wyoming. After morning recoveries of 10-30%, RH will drop to 3-10% this afternoon. Established large incidents will likely see a marked increase in fire behavior across the Four Corners, with risks for escaped containment growing as southwest winds gust from 30-45 mph. Lightning holdovers may also emerge from recent monsoon activity across the southwestern U.S. In the Northwest, westerly gap winds will continue through the Cascades, but RH will be a bit higher as temperatures drop several degrees from Friday's highs.
