Predictive Services Discussion:

Breezy north winds gusting to 40 mph are expected in the Sacramento Valley today amid relative humidity as low as 10% will create elevated conditions. An upper-level low will bring showers and thunderstorms to much of the Southwest and Greater Four Corners today, with isolated to scattered mainly wet thunderstorms from the eastern Sierra into central Nevada and Utah. Scattered showers and thunderstorms will develop across southwest Montana this afternoon and spread into central and eastern Montana overnight. Much of the Northwest and northern Great Basin will remain dry with locally breezy northwest winds, but cooler temperatures will keep relative humidity above critical levels. Areas of breezy south to southwest winds gusting to 30 mph in the Great Lakes amid relative humidity of 20-30% will bring locally elevated conditions, with scattered showers and thunderstorms in the northern Plains expected to move into Minnesota overnight. Drier conditions are expected in much of the eastern US behind a cold front, but scattered showers and thunderstorms will develop in South Florida. Dry but seasonable conditions are expected across much of Interior Alaska today due to weak upper-level high pressure.
