Predictive Services Discussion:

West to southwest sustained winds of 12-20 mph gusting to 30 mph amid minimum relative humidity of 8-15% will create locally elevated conditions in southeast Arizona and southwest New Mexico. Isolated wet thunderstorms will develop in the Sierra, with scattered showers and thunderstorms developing from southern Nevada eastward through the Four Corners to the Front Range. Isolated showers and thunderstorms are also expected to develop across east-central Idaho, southern Montana, and much of Wyoming, as well. Scattered showers and thunderstorms will develop across much of the Plains from the Dakotas to North and West Texas, with the greatest threat for severe thunderstorms from southern Kansas and Oklahoma to the Big Bend. Dry conditions are expected in the Great Lakes with minimum relative humidity as low as 25% but winds will be light. A cold front will continue to slowly move into the Ohio Valley and Northeast producing scattered showers and thunderstorms, while scattered thunderstorms continue in Florida and along the southeast Atlantic coast. Cooler than normal conditions with scattered to widespread showers will continue across southern Alaska and into the Interior, with a few isolated thunderstorms in the Interior. Breezy trade winds are expected across Hawaii with a few windward showers.
