Lower Sugarloaf, Okanogan-Wenatchee NF, USFS. CIMT (NW Team 10). Twelve miles northeast of Leavenworth, WA. Timber and brush. Moderate fire behavior with flanking, backing and creeping. Numerous residences threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

Labor Mountain, Okanogan-Wenatchee NF, USFS. CIMT (NW Team 12). Ten miles north of Cle Elum, WA. Timber and brush. Moderate fire behavior with flanking, backing and torching. Numerous residences threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect. Precipitation occurred over the fire area yesterday.

Moon Complex, Rogue River-Siskiyou NF, USFS. CIMT (NW Team 7). Eleven miles northeast of Agness, OR. Closed timber litter and timber. Minimal fire behavior with backing, creeping and smoldering. Numerous structures threatened. Road and trail closures in effect. Precipitation occurred over the fire area yesterday.

Wildcat, Okanogan-Wenatchee NF, USFS. Thirty miles west of Naches, WA. Timber, brush and closed timber litter. Moderate fire behavior with backing, flanking and single tree torching. Numerous structures threatened. Area, road and trail closures in effect.

Lynx Mountain, Colville Agency, BIA. Seven miles northwest of Inchelium, WA. Brush, timber and medium slash. Moderate fire behavior with smoldering and creeping. Road closures in effect. Last report unless significant activity occurs.

Bear Gulch, Olympic NF, USFS. Ten miles northwest of Hoodspert, WA. Timber. Minimal fire behavior with creeping, backing and smoldering. Structures threatened. Area, road and trail closures in effect. Last report unless significant activity occurs.

Foley Ridge, Willamette NF, USFS. Thirty-five miles west of Bend, OR. Timber and closed timber litter. Minimal fire behavior with smoldering. Structures threatened. Area, road and trail closures in effect. Last report unless significant activity occurs.

Emigrant, Willamette NF, USFS. Twenty-four miles southeast of Oakridge, OR. Medium slash, timber and closed timber litter. No new information.

Cumulative acres shown in the Active Incident Resource Summary Table may not be reflected in the YTD statistics due to a lag in units completing YTD adjustments in the SIT/209 Application. Otherwise, changes in agency YTD fires and acres reflect more accurate mapping or reporting adjustments.

Predictive Services Discussion:

Strong southerly winds gusting to 45 mph are expected on much of the northern Plains into western Minnesota into Saturday. Elevated conditions are most likely in northeast Wyoming and western South Dakota today where minimum relative humidity will fall to 12-20%, while other areas will experience minimum humidity near or above 25%. Breezy southerly winds will also occur on the southern Plains, with the strongest winds gusting to 35 mph Saturday afternoon amid minimum relative humidity as low as 15%. Strong southwest winds 20-30 mph with gusts to 50 mph are likely across the Mojave Desert and northern Arizona, but recent rainfall will mitigate the conditions. Isolated showers will continue in the Northwest today, with more widespread rain across the northern Great Basin into southwest Montana and northwest Wyoming this afternoon that will spread into the northern Plains Saturday, and portions of the central Plains Saturday.

Much of the eastern US will remain dry, with low relative humidity down to 20% continuing in the Lower Great Lakes to the Mid-Atlantic. Winds will mostly be light, but southwest winds ahead of a cold front will affect the Great Lakes Sunday, with areas of elevated conditions most likely in Lower Michigan where fuels are driest. The Southeast will also be mostly dry through Saturday except for Florida, where east winds will bring showers on Atlantic moisture, with isolated showers and thunderstorms spreading to the Gulf Coast and portions of the Southeast Sunday.
