Predictive Services Discussion:

Breezy west to southwest winds will develop across the central and southern High Plains today and tomorrow amid minimum relative humidity of 6-18% creating elevated to critical conditions. Isolated to scattered thunderstorms will develop across South Georgia and the Florida panhandle today, with several new ignitions possible. Precipitation will wind down across the northern Rockies today, as a storm strengthens on the northern Plains and moves into the Great Lakes tomorrow. Snow is expected in the Dakotas to northern Minnesota, while strong to severe thunderstorms develop across the southern Plains to the Mid-Mississippi Valley tomorrow. The storm will weaken as it moves east, but widespread precipitation will fall from much of the eastern Plains to the west slopes of the Appalachians. Precipitation will be more scattered as the cold front moves through the Southeast this weekend, with most areas receiving less than a quarter inch of rain from the Piedmont to the coast. A period of weak to moderate Santa Ana winds will develop across southern California today and continue into tomorrow before diminishing by Sunday. Cool and mostly dry conditions will continue in Alaska while trade winds diminish in Hawai'i as land and sea breezes are expected this weekend.
