* **Foster Bridge**, National Forests in Florida, USFS. Four miles southeast of Estifanulga, FL. Southern rough. Active fire behavior with backing, flanking and running.

* **Flat Tire**, Oklahoma DOF. Eighteen miles west of Beaver, OK. Grass. Moderate fire behavior with creeping and smoldering. Structures threatened.

* **No Tire**, Oklahoma DOF. Eighteen miles west of Beaver, OK. Grass. Active fire behavior with running and creeping.

* **Gray**, Okmulgee Agency, BIA. Five miles northeast of Hannah, OK. Hardwood litter. Active fire behavior with running, flanking and backing. Structures threatened.

* **Indian Creek**, Oklahoma DOF. Three miles east of Elohim City, OK. Timber and brush. Moderate fire behavior with creeping and uphill runs. Last report unless significant activity occurs.

* **Spring Creek**, Oklahoma DOF. Seven miles southwest of Red Oak, OK. Hardwood litter and timber. Active fire behavior with flanking and creeping. Last report unless significant activity occurs.

* **MM 75**, Oklahoma DOF. Six miles west of Weatherford, OK. Grass and timber. Minimal fire behavior with smoldering. Structures threatened. Last report unless significant activity occurs.

* **Shagbark**, Oklahoma DOF. Two miles southwest of Bunch, OK. Timber and brush. Minimal fire behavior. Last report unless significant activity occurs.

* **Rattlesnake**, Oklahoma DOF. Twenty-three miles northeast of McAlester, OK. Hardwood litter and timber. Minimal fire behavior. Structures threatened. Last report unless significant activity occurs.

* **W Boundary RD**, Florida Forest Service. Twenty miles southeast of Immokalee, FL. Grass and southern rough. Active fire behavior. Last report unless significant activity occurs.

* **Winding Stair**, National Forests in North Carolina, USFS. Eight miles west of Franklin, NC. Timber. Minimal fire behavior. Last report unless significant activity occurs.

* **Starkies Return**, Louisiana Office of Forestry. Six miles northeast of Starks, LA. Southern rough. Minimal fire behavior with backing. Last report unless significant activity occurs.

Pace, Florida Forest Service. Five miles east of Interlachen, FL. Grass. No new information. Last report unless significant activity occurs.

Horseshoe Creek, Florida Forest Service. Eight miles northeast of Mexico Beach, FL. Southern rough. Moderate fire behavior. Last report unless significant activity occurs.

Cumulative acres shown in the Active Incident Resource Summary Table may not be reflected in the YTD statistics due to a lag in units completing YTD adjustments in the SIT/209 Application. Otherwise, changes in agency YTD fires and acres reflect more accurate mapping or reporting adjustments.

Predictive Services Discussion:

An upper-level low will move from the Southwest today and across the southern tier of the country through the weekend. Widespread wetting precipitation is expected from the central Plains and Ohio Valley south to the Gulf Coast. However, rainfall will be more scattered and lighter in the High Plains, South Texas and Florida peninsula, with a period of elevated conditions likely due to breezy conditions Saturday in South Texas. Another storm will move into the West Coast late Sunday into early next week, then progress northeast into the Plains and Great Lakes the remainder of the week. Widespread valley rain and mountain snow is expected in the West, but downsloping will lead to much drier conditions from the Plains eastward. In addition, periods of strong winds are likely mid-next week across the central and southern Plains. While precipitation this weekend will mitigate the impact of the winds for some areas, those that receive only light rainfall are likely to have elevated to critical conditions with the winds.

Light snow across the central and eastern Interior of Alaska will give way to much colder and drier conditions this weekend into next week. To the south and west, periods of unsettled weather are expected for southwest Alaska and portions of south-central Alaska. For Hawai'i, breezy trade winds will continue through the weekend, but uncertainty increases next week as a potential cold front may move through or remain too far west, where trade winds would continue.
