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# IMSR Update (Maegan Maughan)

PL3, light IA, 24 uncontained large fires, 8 CIMTs, 111 crews, 178 engines, 53 helicopters, 5,134 personnel assigned. 2 IMTs, 5 crews, 70 overhead personnel assigned in Canada.

Northwest: PL2, 1 uncontained large fire, 1 CIMT.

Pomas – NW Team 7, moderate behavior, light fuels, 1,620 acres, 0% contained.

**South Ops:** PL3, 24 new fires, 1 uncontained large fire. Lake – Cal Fire, minimal behavior, light fuels, evacuations, 485 acres, 25% contained. Wolf – 1,400 acres, 10% contained.

**Northern Rockies:** PL2, light IA, 1 uncontained large fire, 1 CIMT. Jericho Mountain – NR Team 6, minimal behavior, timber, 493 acres, 40% contained. Nettleton Gulch – 26 acres, beginning engagement with crews.

**Great Basin:** PL3, 16 new starts, 3 uncontained large fires, 2 CIMTs. Forsyth – GB Team 7, extreme behavior, timber and brush, community and infrastructure threatened, 12,800 acres, 26% contained. France Canyon – GB Team 5, active behavior, timber, 33,000 acres, 24% contained. Homer – BOD, 366 acres, 100% contained.

**Rocky Mountain:** PL2, 8 new incidents, 1 uncontained large fire. Horse Draw – Moderate behavior, light fuels, 748 acres, 85% contained. Taylor Draw – 1,000 acres, no concerns.

Alaska: PL4, discussing PL5, 14 uncontained large fires, 2 CIMTs. Himalaya Road – AK DOF, SW Team 3, managing Aggie Creek, moderate behavior, timber, received precipitation, residences threatened, 3,500 acres, 0% contained. Bear Creek – AK DOF, AK Team 1, managing Saint George Creek, minimal behavior, received precipitation, timber, structures threatened, evacuations, 27,943 acres, 0% contained. All other AK fires are holding steady at current acreage with minimal behavior, expecting increased heat and dry weather.

**Southwest:** PL3, no new incidents, 3 uncontained large fires, 2 CIMTs. Trout – SW Team 4 TOC local unit today, minimal behavior, light fuels and timb.

Trout – SW Team 4 TOC local unit today, minimal behavior, light fuels and timber, 47,294 acres, 88% contained.

Oak Ridge - SW Team 2, chaparral and timber, 6,292 acres, 0% contained.















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# **Predictive Services Update**

#### Weather Summary (Jim Wallmann)

# WEATHER SUMMARY

#### Short-term (through Friday)

- Across the Inland Northwest, temperatures will push into the mid-90s to 100°F with minimum RH in the upper single digits to teens under generally light terrain-driven winds
- Dry thunderstorms to develop Monday across interior mountains of northern California, bringing abundant lightning, spreading into interior Oregon and northern California Tuesday as mixed wet/dry thunderstorms and the northern Great Basin to northern Rockies later in the week
- Shower and thunderstorms will increase across Arizona and into the eastern Great Basin and West Slope Tuesday through Thursday, with a mix of wet/dry thunderstorms, wettest Thursday and across the Southwest
- Widespread dry and gusty winds on Wednesday afternoon will result in elevated to critical fire weather conditions across the Cascade Gaps, with elevated afternoon winds across most of the western US
- Becoming very and warm and dry across Alaska this week with increasing significant fire potential, and breezy easterly winds are likely Wednesday across the central/eastern Interior

#### Long-term (Saturday through next Wednesday)

- Breezy southwest winds likely for the southern/eastern Great Basin and central Rockies this weekend creating elevated to critical conditions
- Temperatures will rise to above normal for much of the northern two-thirds of the West by mid-next week, with the heat focused on the Great Basin and central Rockies with long burn periods possible
- The monsoon will slowly return to the Southwest next week with gradual moistening
- Continued dry for much of the southern Plains, with IA likely to increase for central/East Texas

#### **Fuels Summary (Steve Larrabee)**

Fuels and Fire Behavior Advisory issued 6/27 for SW UT.

Fuels and Fire Behavior Advisory for Gila/White Mountains rescinded 6/27.

Fuels and Fire Behavior Advisory for SE Arizona may be rescinded this week.

Fuels and Fire Behavior Advisories being considered for GB and AK.

Western GAs have continued to dry with ERC percentiles well into the mid to upper 90s.

Expect more significant fire activity, both increased IA and large fires.

AK anticipating minimally improved conditions in parts of the state but no consistent moderation.
