Orleans – CA Team 1 TOC CA Team 4 tomorrow, active behavior, timber, structures threatened, 18,840 acres, 9% contained.

Green – CA Team 3, no perimeter growth, isolated heat, minimal behavior, brush, residences threatened, 19,022 acres, 60% contained.

Northwest: PL3, light IA, 11 uncontained large fires, 7 CIMTs, 1 NIMO Team.

Burdoin – NW Team 13, moderate behavior, timber and grass, structures and infrastructure threatened, evacuations, 10,973 acres, 5% contained.

Predictive Services Update

Weather Summary (Andy Snyder)

WEATHER SUMMARY

Short-term (through Friday)

- An accelerated drying trend is on track for most of the western interior through Friday as abundant lightning targets northern California into parts of the northern Intermountain West Thursday and Friday
- Quickly drying fuels and longer burn periods in areas that have seen lightning and higher moisture during the last week
 will result in increased activity and the potential for holdover fires to emerge
- Single-digit relative humidity will become more widespread through the end of the week for the central and southern Intermountain West, extending into western Colorado and New Mexico by Friday
- · The monsoon will largely shut down with this drying trend by Friday
- Look for increasing westerly Cascade gap winds Thursday and Friday, resulting in locally elevated fire weather in the interior Northwest
- · Extreme heat persists in most of the Mississippi Valley as flash flooding targets the Midwest and Gulf Coast into Friday

Long-term (Saturday through next Friday)

- Thunderstorms continue from the northern Sierra and southern Cascades northeast into Montana Saturday, becoming more confined to the northern Rockies Sunday
- Breezy/dry for the Great Basin, Arizona, Wyoming, and northwest Colorado this weekend creating elevated to critical conditions and areas of high-risk significant fire potential.
- Extreme heat builds across the Southern Plains and expands west and north through the Rockies and Interior into next week, but the West Coast likely remains milder
- After the monsoon wanes this weekend, a robust return to the monsoon is expected by mid to late next week for southern/eastern Arizona, New Mexico, and Colorado
- Significant uncertainty for the northwestern extent of the monsoon, with large uncertainty in thunderstorm potential
 for the Great Basin, Inland Northwest, and northern Rockies
- Drying for Interior Alaska this weekend, of most concern for the Yukon Flats which have received little rain this week



Abundant wet and dry lightning across NOPS, GB, and the NW with breezy winds through the end of the week.

Fuels Summary (Ryan Jones)

Eastern interior of AK is seeing decreasing indices and better conditions.

NOPS seeing downward trend and improving fuels though still at 80-90th percentile with IA probability.

AZ and NM indices increasing as fuels continue drying.

Fuels Advisory likely from GB in the next couple of days.

NW expecting GAP winds.

NOPS and GB expecting lightning over the next two days.
