Predictive Services Update

Weather Summary (Alex Melitsis)

WEATHER SUMMARY

Short-term (through Sunday)

- A prolonged period of well above normal temperature, low RH, and poor overnight continues across California
 and the Pacific Northwest today, over the weekend, and into next week.
- The monsoon slowly moves north and west, with improving conditions in the Southwest this weekend, but a significant increase in activity (and possibly initial attack) due to dry lightning is expected on the periphery from southern California into the northern Great Basin and central Rockies today and this weekend.
- Continued dry in northern New England, with a period of breezy/dry north to northeast winds today in the wake
 of Hurricane Erin, with breezy winds also expected on Sunday

Long-term (Monday through next Sunday)

- Hot temperatures continue for Washington and the Northern Rockies through midweek with very low RH and poor overnight recovery before modest relief from some monsoon moisture later in the week
- Monsoon moisture moves northward, with isolated to scattered mixed wet/dry thunderstorms gradually spreading to the Canadian Border by Wednesday/Thursday for new ignitions
- Dry air will return to the northern half of the West by next weekend, with above normal temperatures and low RH, but the strength of winds is uncertain
- The monsoon will continue to bring relief to the southern half of the West through much of next week before it weakens next weekend
- Continued very dry for coastal New England with periods of breezy/dry westerly winds, while Florida and Oklahoma see relief but Texas may remain drier



Fuels Summary (Steve Larrabee)

ERCs increasing sharply across far West due to hot temperatures.

Fuels in Intermountain West remains very dry but expected to improve in SW and adjacent parts of RM and S GB, plus areas of The Divide and S Plains.
