PL4, moderate IA, 247 new starts, 42 uncontained large fires, 19 CIMTs, 4 MAFFS, 6 Medevac Army helicopters, 382 crews, 925 engines, 108 helicopters, 18,500 personnel assigned.

North Ops: PL4, 130 new starts, 4 uncontained large fires, 3 CIMTs, many additional fires 15-60 acres.

Dillon – CA Team 1, extreme behavior, spot on Klamath River doubled, timber and brush, residences threatened, evacuations, 2,100 acres, 0% contained.

Peak – CA Team 2, moderate behavior, timber and brush, structures threatened, 290 acres, 0% contained. Pickett – Cal Fire Team 4, minimal behavior, timber and light fuels, residences and infrastructure threatened, 6,800 acres, 33% contained.

Northwest: PL3, moderate IA, 42 new starts, 4 uncontained large fires, 3 CIMTs.

Emigrant – NW Team 13, active behavior, timber, 7,700 acres, 0% contained.

Flat – ODF Team 3, moderate behavior, received precipitation, light fuels, structures threatened, evacuations, 23,300 acres, 7% contained.

Bear Gulch – CA Team 7 TOC local unit today, moderate behavior, timber, residences threatened, 8,900 acres, 13% contained.

**South Ops:** PL3, moderate IA, 3 uncontained large fires, 3 CIMTs.

Garnet – CA Team 10, active behavior, light fuels, structures and infrastructure threatened, 14,000 acres, 0%

Little – CA Team 6, minimal behavior, grass and timber, residences threatened, evacuations, 2,530 acres, 29% contained.

Gifford – CA Team 8, minimal behavior, light fuels, infrastructure threatened, 131,600 acres, 95% contained.

Northern Rockies: PL3, 3 new starts, 12 uncontained large fires, 5 CIMTs, widespread precipitation.

Sunset – IDL, NR Team 5 TOC local unit this weekend, moderate behavior, grass and timber, structures and infrastructure threatened, 3,200 acres, 66% contained.

Ransome – Active behavior, timber, residences threatened, 568 acres, 0% contained.

Windy Rock – MT DNR, NW Team 2, managing Devil Mountain, active behavior, timber, residences threatened, evacuations, 2,300 acres, 0% contained.

Devil Mountain – Active behavior, grass and timber, residences threatened, evacuations, 1,650 acres,0% contained.

Bivens Creek – NR Team 6, managing Cloudrest, minimal behavior, received precipitation, timber, structures threatened, 2,233 acres, 34% contained.

Corral Creek – Minimal behavior, received precipitation, timber, infrastructure threatened, 364 acres, 31% contained.

West Fork – Moderate behavior, received precipitation, timber and brush, residences threatened, 853 acres, 40% contained.

Knowles – MT DNR, moderate behavior, timber and grass, structures threatened, evacuations, 3,822 acres, 26% contained.

Sandbar 2 – NW Team 8 TOC local unit today, minimal behavior, timber 243 acres, 75% contained. Island Creek – NR Team 2, active behavior, slash and timber, structures threatened, 11,591 acres, 5% contained.

Great Basin: PL3, 13 new starts, 9 uncontained large fires, 3 CIMTs.















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Dollar Lake – Moderate behavior, timber, evacuations, habitat threatened, 13,449 acres, 0% contained. Rock – GB Team 6, minimal behavior, light precipitation, timber and brush, structures and infrastructure threatened, 2,792 acres, 42% contained.

Cottonwood Peak – EA Team 1, minimal behavior, light fuels, structures threatened, habitat threatened, received precipitation, 132,604 acres, 60% contained.

Widemouth – Minimal behavior, light fuels, 683 acres, 56% contained.

Monroe Canyon – GB Team 3, received precipitation, minimal behavior, brush and timber, structures and infrastructure threatened, 73,700 acres, 90% contained.

Buckley Draw – Minimal behavior, light fuels, received precipitation, 452 acres, 42% contained.

**Southern Area:** PL1, 16 new starts, 1 uncontained large fire. Centro – Moderate behavior, grass, 929 acres, 65% contained.

Rocky Mountain: PL2, 13 new starts, 6 uncontained large fires, 1 CIMT.

Derby – NR Team 3, minimal behavior, light fuels, structures threatened, received precipitation, 5,700 acres, 4% contained.

Stoner Mesa – Minimal behavior, timber, structures threatened, received precipitation, 10,200 acres, 43% contained.

Lee – Minimal behavior, light fuels, structures and infrastructure threatened, received precipitation, 137,758 acres, 90% contained.

Red Canyon – Minimal behavior, light fuels, 124,700 acres, 80% contained.

Southwest: PL2, 3 new starts, 3 uncontained large fires, 1 CIMT.

Dragon Bravo – CA Team 9, minimal behavior, brush, 145,504 acres, 64% contained.

Billy – Minimal behavior, brush, structures threatened, 27,574 acres, 60% contained.

## Weather Summary (Jim Wallmann)

## **WEATHER SUMMARY**

#### Short-term (through Saturday)

- Moisture will be focused across northern Idaho and southwest Montana today with season-slowing conditions and light to moderate rainfall continuing, with rain lighter and more scattered to the west in Washington
- A drying trend will slowly push eastward into Saturday, with isolated wet thunderstorms confined to areas east of the Divide by Saturday
- RH will be slow to lower in the Great Basin, but single digit to teens RH is likely by Saturday for the Inland Northwest and California
- Relief for Oklahoma into the Lower Mississippi Valley due to abundant rainfall, but Texas will see more limited relief, while an increase in thunderstorms is expected across Florida
- Scattered showers and thunderstorms for the Northeast today/tomorrow, but the Mid-Atlantic will remain dry

#### Long-term (Sunday through next Saturday)

- A moderate strength upper-level ridge will build across the West for above normal temperatures and lower RHs.
   Temperatures up to 20°F above normal for northern California and the Northwest
- The monsoon continues in southeast Arizona and New Mexico, possibly spreading into southern/central Arizona and near/east of the Divide in Colorado
- A chance of mixed wet/dry thunderstorms for the southern Great Basin and southern California mid-next week, possibly moving into northern California.
- Dry conditions are expected for most of the West with low RH and areas of poor overnight recovery, but significant fire
  potential will remain low for most areas due to this week's rain, with the highest potential in northern California and
  the Northwest
- A drier than normal pattern is likely to continue for much of the northern two-thirds of the eastern US next week, although some wetting rain is possible for portions of the area late next week



## Fuels Summary (Mark Williams)

Precipitation received through most GAs.

Weather event appears to be season slowing rather than season-ending.

Long-term drying continues in NW, NOPS, and SOPS.
