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Predictive Services Update

Weather Summary (Jim Wallmann)

WEATHER SUMMARY

Short-term (through Saturday)

- Hot, dry, and unstable conditions to persist in Washington to the Idaho Panhandle into Saturday with significant
 fire growth likely and potential pyroCbs, but activity may be diminished in some areas due to increased smoke
 impacting solar insolation
- Isolated mixed wet/dry thunderstorms for northeast California and Oregon today, turning wetter tomorrow, with isolated mixed wet/dry thunderstorms into portions of Washington and central Idaho tomorrow
- Monsoon continues for the central/southern Great Basin, West Slope, and Southwest with daily scattered wet thunderstorms
- A cold front to bring breezy/dry northwest winds to the northern Plains tomorrow and freezing temperatures to the Upper Midwest, but areas of relief to New England and the Mid-Atlantic Friday into Saturday
- · Breezy/dry southerly winds creating locally elevated conditions in Texas ahead of the front tomorrow

Long-term (Sunday through next Saturday)

- Gradually cooling temperatures in the West by mid-next week, with season-slowing precipitation most likely for Oregon, which may spread into Washington, the northern Great Basin, and northern Rockies late next week
- Breezy/dry southwesterly winds for much of the Great Basin into the northern/central Rockies early to mid-next week, with the greatest concern for the Sierra Front, western Montana, and western Wyoming
- Cool and dry conditions for the Midwest to the Northeast next week with temperatures slowly warming through
 the week, and breezy/dry northwesterly winds possible late next week, while dry conditions return to Texas
- A tropical depression is likely to form in the western tropical Atlantic this weekend, some impacts possible for Puerto Rico and the US Virgin Islands and Hurricane Kiko in the central Pacific may impact Hawai'i mid-next week

Fuels Summary (Steve Larrabee)

NW is likely peaking today before seeing some recovery for new ignitions. NOPS may see a couple days of escalating fire danger before recovery.
