PL3, light IA, 107 new starts, 51 uncontained large fires, 17 CIMTs, 401 crews, 955 engines, 108 helicopters, 18,762 personnel assigned.

North Ops: PL3, 18 new starts, 6 uncontained large fires, 1 CIMT.

Blue – CA Team 6, managing Dillon and Log, minimal behavior, timber, 3,600 acres, 28% contained.

Northwest: PL4, light IA, 18 new starts, 22 uncontained large fires, 10 CIMTs.

Lower Sugarloaf – NW Team 3, managing Labor Mountain, moderate behavior, timber and brush, structures threatened, evacuations, 14,323 acres, 0% contained.

Labor Mountain – Moderate behavior, timber and brush, structures threatened, 4,000 acres, 0% contained.

Weather Summary (Gina McGuire)

WEATHER SUMMARY

Short-term (through Sunday)

- Cool temperatures, higher RH, scattered showers and thunderstorms and scattered wetting rain for much of the Intermountain West with brief warming and drying in the Northwest and western Great Basin Friday/Saturday.
- Another low moves into the Northwest Sunday bringing light to locally moderate rainfall, thunderstorms and breezy winds.
- Gusty south to southwest winds and dry conditions through the weekend from West Texas into the Central Plains.
- Hotter and drier for the Plains into the East, with the hottest temperatures from the southern Plains across the Mississippi Valley where record heat may occur.
- · Showers and thunderstorms continue in Florida.

Long-term (Monday through next Sunday)

- Low pressure tracks across the northern Great Basin and northern Rockies through early next week. Another
 round of precipitation is likely across the northern Great Basin and northern Rockies early next week with
 potentially season-slowing/ending conditions for the northern Rockies.
- Warmer and drier weather returns early to mid-next week for the West as ridging rebuilds.
- Hot and continued dry conditions for the Mid/Lower Mississippi and Ohio Valley into the Southeast, with near record heat in the Mississippi Valley.
- Showers and thunderstorms may develop in the Mid-Atlantic and Coastal Southeast next week, but confidence is

Fuels Summary (Steve Larrabee)

ERCs looking good overall across the country.

Longer term potential suggests NW will increase in behavior again.
